# Teals' 'fake online newspaper' an insult to regional communities and media outlets

Leader of The Nationals David Littleproud said the Teals' 'fake online news site', funded by Teal donors, is extremely misleading to local communities and harmful to regional Australian media organisations.

Mr Littleproud said it is disappointing the Teals have launched online 'Gazette News' in a bid to deceive residents where Teals are taking on The Nationals MPs and candidates.

It comes amid revelations Gazette's three major funders, who are based in Sydney, have donated more than \$1.7 million to Climate 200 and associated candidates.

The outlet includes coverage of its Climate 200-backed Independents.

"Regional outlets and newspapers are the backbone of our regional communities," Mr Littleproud said.

"The Teals lectured us about integrity in politics in the 2022 campaign, so why not just be honest with people, that this is just another form of political party advertising?

"The Melbourne millionaires running the Teal Party are taking country people for mugs, but they don't understand that's not



how we do things in regional Australia.

"A key funder of Gazette News falsely claims the outlet provides journalism to communities where local news has 'declined or disappeared'. This just happens to be in their target seats."

Mr Littleproud added regional papers rely on advertising, not Facebook, to survive.

"If the Teals are so desperate to message. why are they shunning our local journalists? The turning their backs on regional media outlets is also the Teals turning their backs on the local community, to boost their own self-made stories."



trained aeromedical crews are learning to see in the dark with the help of night vision goggles.

New data released this week shows 32 per cent of airlifts in the year's first quarter so far have taken place at night.

For Chinchilla Hospital nurse Xanthe Dewar, the technology was vital in airlifting her son late at night during a medical emergency.

at Goomburra last year with her husband Ben and their twin four-month-old boys Harvey and Patrick.

Harvey woke up one morning with increased respiratory effort, with a nasty looking rash on his right leg and a swollen fontanelle, Ms Dewar was concerned he may have meningococcal.

They drove to Warwick Hospital where the doctor confirmed meningococcal was a possibility and Harvey would need to be airlifted

to Queensland Children's Hospital (QCH)

By 9pm she was in the LifeFlight helicopter with Harvey enroute to Brisbane and 29 minutes later, touched at the QCH helipad.

"Thankfully, our little man didn't have a life-threatening disease and was treated for a viral infection and thanks to LifeFlight, we were able to get to Queensland Children's Hospital quickly to rule out meningococcal."

The mission to airlift Harvey was one of thousands undertaken at night by LifeFlight crews using night vision goggles (NVG), which are an essential tool of the trade for emergency medical

LifeFlight Head of Flying Operations Jeremy Ovens, said the technology is lifesaving.

"You could have someone stranded on the edge of a cliff at night, and

that rescue just wouldn't be

areas where there is a lack of light at night, such as school sports ovals or paddocks, so the goggles enable us to execute landings safely.

"We can also see obstacles such as trees and power poles, which without the goggles would be impossible because it's pitch black."

LifeFlight Chief Operating Officer Lee Schofield, said the increasing frequency of night-time airlifts means more Queenslanders need

# Hemp defies cyclone's big blow

industrial hemp proved too strong for Cyclone Alfred when it pounded paddocks at Gatton last week.

Only one week ahead of harvest, the small plot of low-THC hemp withstood winds gusting up to 125kmh and the floods accompanying the once-in-50year weather event.

"The outer plants bore the brunt of the wind, but protected the rest of the crop," said Lauchlan Grout, chief operating officer of the hemp seed company undertaking the field trials at the University of Queensland farm.

The 110-day crop stands 4m high. "We expect to redeem about 90% of this crop, even after a major cyclone," Mr Grout said.

"The cellular rigidity of the stems - the property that makes hemp so suited to building materials - kept the plants upright through it all.

"It proves our varieties are sturdy - they can withstand the elements. Hemp offers growers a cash or break crop when other crops are prone to flattening."

Mr Grout, who is also vicepresident of the Australian Hemp Council continued: "Our industrial hemp fibres offers unparalleled tensile strength. Enriched with

silica, industrial hemp develops fortified cell walls and vascular structures.

"Industrial hemp is nature's ultimate survivor. Deep root system anchors it firmly in the soil, its resilient fibres withstand extreme forces and its adaptive biology thrives in the face of drought, floods and storms."

Mr Grout highlighted the value of locally developed hemp varieties. "Australianbred industrial hemp strains are tailored for our unique climate, providing higher viability and better agronomic performance compared to imported seeds," he said.

He added that, with the possibility of more future weather events driven by climate change,

adapting to hemp could offer cropping continuity for broadacre farmers.

"Moreover. the large-scale planting of industrial hemp provides additional environmental benefits, including significant carbon offset potential.

"This dual role of hemp, in both remediation and carbon sequestration, positions Australia to lead in the development of biomass-based technologies.

"The HFA varieties are specifically bred to deliver optimal harvests for fibre or health-giving hemp-seed," he said.

# **33 Years of Tradition Kicks On**



Southern Downs rugby league clubs the Warwick Cowboys and the Wattles Warriors take to the turf at Warwick's iconic Father Ranger Oval this Saturday evening for the hotly contested Barrett Family Shield & pre-season trials.

The local derby games, highlighted by the first-grade clash for the highly esteemed Shield, will kick off their 2025 Toowoomba Rugby League on field campaign for both clubs, and additionally Wattles 60th year since club formation.

The Cowboys were to match up in a trial against South Coast club the Helensvale Hornets in an early season trial on March 15th. but weather concerns saw the match cancelled.

Saturday will see the 33rd contest between the Cowboys and the Warriors for the honour of hoisting the Shield that has evolved into the prize for preseason Southern Downs league supremacy since the silverware was introduced at Father Ranger Oval for the season opener in 1993.

Since the inaugural clash for the coveted shield, the Warwick Cowboys have claimed success on eighteen occasions, with Wattles finishing winners in thirteen matches, the 2000 season producing the only draw at 8 all.

Saturday evening's player of the match will receive the prestigious Terry Doyle Memorial Medallion, the award presented since 2011, won last year by Wattles fullback Jackson Green.

The medallion winners list features some of the Southern Downs outstanding players over the past fourteen years.

Warwick half/hooker Ben Sullivan a sensational three-time winner in 2018, 2019 & 2021; outstanding Wattles halfback Matt Duggan a two-time winner in 2013 & 2020 and Cowboys classy English forward Garry Ellery, also a two-time player of the match winner in 2012 & 2014.

and Wattles' mentor Travis Burns certainly agree on the point that the opposition in Barrett Shield trials are tough units to roll, "our local derby's breed a fierce competitive atmosphere," said Burns.

"We are certainly looking forward to the Shield clash with Wattles" said Speed, "both sides always lift for this occasion and give their all with respect to the Barrett Family and their association with both clubs."

The concept for the Shield that has become a tradition in rugby league circles across south west Queensland was born at a Wattles (both images - Wattles RLF Club) Club committee meeting in 1992, the result of a suggestion that a trophy be introduced for the annual Wattles verses Warwick trial.

Wattles President Mary Hamblin (nee Barrett) offered a trophy in the Barrett family's name.

The Barrett name is synonymous with rugby league throughout the Darling Downs and South West Queensland region, boasting strong league links in the Southern Downs area especially, the family entrenched in the Warwick and Wattles Clubs.

The Toowoomba Rugby League can boast a no more intensely contested encounter in the crank up for the 2025 season on the Southern Downs, President Dayne Barrett and his Warwick Cowboys committee are expecting an overwhelming crowd at Father Ranger Oval.




