Allora based ardent rugby league followers Greg Patterson and Luke Whitten are firing up for the National Rugby League climax on Sunday when the Canterbury Bulldogs take on the Melbourne Storm at Sydney's Telstra Stadium in what should be a bell ringer of a match to decide the 2012 NRL Premiership.

The Bulldogs have finished the 2012 season as Minor Premiers, and have edged in as slight favourites in the final NRL encounter of the year. That may be so but knowledge chiseled from a local league career stretching over 23 years has Storm loyalist Luke Whitten happy to be the underdogs. The Melbourne based club have been supported by Luke since they entered the competition in 1995, and "they have been a club to dominate the competition since" according to the Storm Allora A long serving Ambassador. veteran of the front row in Warwick Cowboy's and Wattles teams over the past decade, Luke sights the big three, fullback Billy Slater, halfback Cooper Cronk and hooker Cameron Smith as the

A former Wattles senior grade player and Allora State School backline five-eight, Patto's confidence hinges on the domination of the giant Bulldogs pack. Recent NRL Daily M winner Ben Barba has been the stand out player in the NRL this year, "and Sunday won't be any different" according to the man whose mobile phone displays his own number as 'Bulldogs Head Office'. "Greg Eastwood is in great form and will lead the boys home to our first premiership since 2004 when we beat the Roosters 16 - 13".

Greg has been a proud devotee of the Bulldogs since 1970, and the mere mention of club stalwarts such as Terry Lamb and Steve Mortimer has him searching for superlatives to describe their mighty careers.

Paddo & Whitt got together for an early morning training session on Tuesday, fully booted and spurred in their club colours. While the spirits where rising, both grappled in the shadow of the late Leo Cronin's test touch judge's jersey. Leo ran the line for the second test between Australia and Great Britain at Lang Park in Brisbane, and was a referee of renown

Herbert Street, Allora bus stop to be relocated

The Southern Downs Regional Council would like to advise residents in Allora of upcoming works in relation to the construction of the new medical centre.

The Allora community and Southern Downs Regional Council have sourced funds to build a new, much needed, medical centre for the community at 45 Herbert Street, Allora. This project is being funded by the Australian Government.

During Council's site visits, it has been noted that there is a bus stop located in front of the proposed allotment where the new medical centre is to be sited.

"In order to accommodate the new building, the bus stop will need to be relocated," advised Michael Bell, Council's Manager Parks and Major Projects.

"The precise details of this relocation are vet to be finalised, but Council will be taking into account issues such as the timing of the works and any other concerns prior to works commencing," he added.

At this stage it is proposed to relocate the bus stop around the corner onto Warwick Street, an option which was highlighted in the Allora Streetscape plan about 12 months ago.

Council will further advise the Allora community when the proposed works are to commence.





Allora Landcare Group (ALG)

We are pleased to announce that the first stage of our project to re-establish Allora Mountain Reserve as an environmental park is now compete. This has been the restoration of the car park on Forest Plain Road. We started by laying out perimeter garden beds and then mulching them with mulch sourced from the Allora Refuse green waste area. Planting occurred last Thursday morning and the occasion was used to help educate some school children from Allora State School in the magic and mystery of gardening. A large number of native plants and some native trees were purchased as tube stock from Mole Station Native Nursery near Tenterfield. These were then planted in a pre-arranged plan to comply with Council requirements for height and possible obstruction to under and

above ground impediments. To maximise the educational value of the day, David Webster, Supervisor Parks SDRC, came to give a short talk to the children and adults on planting theory and demonstrated the correct technique to deal with vulnerable tube stock.

We also took the opportunity to demarcate the walking track from the car park into the Reserve that has become difficult to see over time. Some white painted rocks now lead walkers in the direction of the reservoir, where the next part of our project will be staged.

Twenty-nine school kids and three teachers became enthusiastically involved in all the activities, and we finished a very successful morning with a sausage sizzle. No food was left, always a good sign.


Maintenance of the plants and trees require water. We had plans to bring it in by tanker, not easy or convenient. We were delighted (and relieved) by the assistance offered by SDRC



employee Peter who provided a standpipe to give us access to an adjacent below-ground hydrant.

This project was larger than we anticipated, and apart from the ALG members who participated in the heavy lifting and moving of mulch, we owe a large number of people thanks for its success; Peter See, Adam Colrain and David Webster from SDRC, Darren from Allora Refuse Station, Brad Johnson from Allora State School, Richard from Allora Building and Landscaping who turned up at 6.30am on a very cold and foggy morning to drill holes for the plants, and Allora Foodworks for the BBQ and utensils for the sausage sizzle. Looking Back... Allora's Past 75 years ago September 1937

St. Matthew's Jubilee

The Diamond Jubilee of the Spring Creek Church of England and the "Back to St. Matthew's" movement were celebrated by a service last Sunday at which the congregation was so large that more than 50 people had to be accommodated outside the building. Many of the visitors were members of old pioneering families and had come long distances. The Rev. T. Hely-Wilson, a former rector of the Allora parish, now of Cleveland, was the preacher. The celebrations continued on Monday with a tea followed by a concert, and the hall accommodation was fully taxed. The guests included Archdeacon Glover (Toowoomba), Canon Neal (Warwick) and Mr. W. A. Deacon M. L. A. The Rev. de la Perelle, rector of the parish of Allora presided. The prominent visitors. as well as Messrs. C. Y. Gillam (people's warden), W. Hinrichsen (rector's warden), and A. Hinson (general warden of the Allora parish) spoke.

Golden Wedding Mr. and Mrs. C. G. Shooter, well known residents of the Allora district, celebrated their Golden Wedding on Sunday, 12th September. The celebrations took place at their residence of more than 45 years at Talgai West.

Mr. Charles Shooter migrated to Queensland from the north of England in 1885 and for some years was employed as a bookkeeper at Jimbour and Maryvale. Mrs. Shooter (formerly Miss Leila Jenner) was born in Brisbane and married Mr. Shooter in St. John's Church of England at Dalby. In 1888 Mr. and Mrs. Shooter selected a block on the Clifton Estate before, in 1912, taking up a share dairy farm on the Talgai West Estate which they purchased two years later. Mr. Shooter served on the Allora Shire Council for ten years and was an active member of the Royal Society of St. George and the Show Society. Mrs. Shooter was a foundation member of the Allora Branch of the Q. C. W. A. and with her husband, an active member of the Church of England. The couple had a family of two daughters and eleven sons, five of whom served in WWI, Pte. Harold Shooter paying the supreme sacrifice.

(At the time of the death of Mrs. Shooter in 1955 there were 36 grandchildren. Grandson Ray and Olive, stalwarts of many organizations in the Allora district, will celebrate their own Golden Wedding in April next year) Allora's Past 100 years ago September 1912 East Talgai Road

A conference of representatives of the Clifton Shire Council and the Allora Town Council was held to consider the serious difficulty that would arise in the event that Mr. G. C. Clark closed his private road from East Talgai to the town boundary as proposed. This road is at present the only available route by which Talgai West farmers can reach Allora. Nothing of a definite nature was resolved at the conference but it was agreed that both local authorities request that Mr. Clark try to keep his road open while something definite could be done in the matter.

Allora Mountain Rejuvenation

Members of Landcare with staff & students from the Allora State School converged on the lower stretches of Allora Mountain last Thursday, the enthusiastic volunteers planting 101 shrubs and trees and creating a path to the Allora Mountain Reserve marked with rocks that were painted white.

The Car Park Planting Project is part of the Allora Landcare Group's (ALG) greater project for Allora Mountain Reserve. The Warwick Shire Council constructed a car park some years ago for the entrance to the Reserve. As there was no sign or evidence of this facility from the road, it was not utilised as was hoped. The planting project aims at raising the awareness of the Reserve and access to it. The Allora Landcare Group's project of the car park planting as well as a path leading visitors through the cattle yards that exist at the entrance to the reserve, will guide visitors to the Allora Mountain Reserve, thus achieving the Group's aims

Initial discussions with the Southern Downs Regional Council provided ALG with information about planting guide requirements and in-kind assistance in the form of free mulch for the project. The Council has also undertaken to provide two bollards at the entrance to the car park together with a blue sign to indicate parking for the Reserve. The new sign will raise awareness of the car park facility and promote its use.

The Council will also replace the 'avenue' of trees previously planted but which have not survived with the recent drought. This avenue will continue up Forest Plain Road, beyond the scope of the car park planting and will be a tree type which will accommodate the power poles further up the road.

Mulching for the tree planting project saw approximately sixty trailer loads of mulch, provided free by the Council, applied to the surrounds of the car park. Herbicide was applied at intervals as breakthrough growth appeared.

With the holes for the trees previously dug by Allora Building and Landscaping, last Thursday morning 29 pupils from Allora State School arrived with two teachers to assist ALG volunteers with planting the trees and shrubs. The pupils were given a short talk on how to choose plants, how to plant and care for them by Parks Supervisor David Webster from the Southern Downs Regional Council. The band of workers enjoyed a sausage sizzle at the end of the day, the barbeque, sauces and utensils provided by FoodWorks.

Allora Landcare Group extend a sincere vote of thanks to Allora State School Principal Shaun Kanowski for his support of the project, the assisting Allora State School pupils, and particularly school staff member Brad Johnson, a member of the Allora Landcare Group.

Special thanks are also extended to the Southern Downs Regional Council for their support, especially Peter See (Director of Engineering Services), Adam Colrain (Manager Design and Assets), David Webster (Supervisor of Parks) and Allora Transfer Station Manager Darren Powell.

Richard Kyle of Allora Building and Landscaping and Allora Foodworks have also provided much appreciated support for the tree planting project.

Obituary: Mrs. Kathleen (Kit) Margaret Telford (1915-2012)

On the 28th July 1915, 97 years ago, Kathleen Margaret Pleash was born to German/Scottish parents William and Mary Pleash at Hendon. The sixth of nine children, the family lived in their two bedroom cottage for many years. Bedtime would have been a barrel of fun as the older children would have to share the beds although the babies slept in the drawers of the dressers for their cribs. As a young girl Kath (affectionately known as Kit) loved the outdoors and particularly enjoyed working with her father on his poultry farm. Her knowledge of poultry kept her in good stead for the next 80 years.

As a young girl she excelled in maths at the former Hendon State School, however, unlike today it wasn't unheard of for girls to get the cane, something of which Kit experienced her fair share.

Younger sister Ethel contracted polio at age six and wasn't able to attend school anymore, so Kath spent a lot of time teaching Ethel to read and write. Kath loved climbing trees (a particular pepperina tree was a good hiding place if trouble seemed imminent), her mother would often come outside looking for her and young Kath could hear her exasperated tones of "I don't know where that kid gets to sometimes".

Kath's mother was also very strict about her and her sisters & brothers attending church of any Christian denomination that passed through town, and Kath's faith in God continued throughout her life. One of the lasting memories of her childhood in Hendon was living next door to the Duggans – a family she always held in high regard and often shared fond memories and stories of their lifelong friendship.

Kath's dream was to be a school teacher, but as times were tough, her parents didn't have the means to send her on to higher education so instead she took up employment as a waitress at Mr Dodd's Royal Hotel in Allora, the Royal Hotel now known as the Blue Cow. She enjoyed the busy times of the weekly pig and calf sales of those days in Allora, as everyone would dine at the hotels. Her day would start by visiting the Chinese market gardeners right next door to St. David's Anglican Church to purchase fresh vegetables for the hotel meals. She also loved the excitement of country dances, having to attend them in a horse and sulky, and spending so much of her time creating new outfits for the occasions. Sewing was a gift Kath had honed and enjoyed, making many dresses and tailored suits right up until aged in her mid 70's.

Kath met Archie Telford from Spring Creek and later married him on a very wet and soggy January day in 1941 at Allora's St. David's Anglican Church, after which the newlyweds caught the train from Allora for their honeymoon destination of Redcliffe.

Settling into married life, Archie & Kath set up home on the dairy farm they bought at Berat, with Kath soon adapting to milking cows and feeding pigs. She would often ride her pony a twenty odd mile round trip to Hendon and back for a family visit.

Kath & Archie's son Syd was born six years after they married, and while an only child, he had plenty of cousins to grow up with.



Kath enjoyed sport immensely, whether it was playing tennis, or listening to all types of sport including horseracing, tennis. cricket and football on the radio or television. Your libraries provide value for

monev

The State Library of Queensland has released a report titled 'The Library Dividend' that seeks to put a dollar value on the services provided by Queensland public libraries.

The report concludes that for every \$100 invested by local government & state government, libraries deliver (on average) \$230 worth of value to their communities. Based on statistics provided annually to the State Library, the figure for Southern Downs libraries is \$222 worth of value - very close to the state average.

"This is an impressive result given that the state average has been calculated with the inclusion of big-budget libraries such as Brisbane & Gold Coast," said Sheila Stebbings, Manager Community Development.

"Southern Downs Libraries provide a wonderful service to our community and it's gratifying to recognise that this service far exceeds the monetary input they receive," she said.

The report also highlighted a high level of support among nonusers for public libraries, with most stating they were happy to fund libraries out of their rates/taxes even if they were not currently making use of the services.

When asked how much they would pay for library services if they were not government-funded, both users and non-users gave an average of \$52. The cost per capita expended on library services across the state is \$41, indicating people would happily pay more than they actually have to!

"This goes to show that people appreciate having access to the wonderful facilities the libraries provide." Ms Stebbings added.


