This year the Duck Race will benefit Show Princess entrants and Allora locals Amy Young Jessica Bool and Carla Frizzell.







Hollywood sparks restoration project in Allora Cemeterv

Fondly known as the Mary Poppins House, 61 Herbert Street in Allora will open its doors to the public on January 27 between 2pm and 5pm. The open house event aims to raise money for a grave site restoration project inspired by a new film produced by Walt Disney Studios starring Tom Hanks, Collin Farrell and Emma Thompson.

The Mary Poppins house was constructed in 1879 as a bank and manager's residence for the Australian Joint Bank but it wasn't until 1905 that Travers Goff, father of the author of the popular Mary Poppins books, took residency as the bank manager. The current property owners Les and Lorraine Struthers recognised the historical importance of Travers Goff and had the idea of restoring his grave in the Allora cemetery after discovering its disrepair three years ago. Up until now, restoration of the house taken priority.

"Our interest in the grave site was rekindled when the director and producer of the new film, Saving Mr Banks, visited us from Hollywood in the winter of 2012 and I showed them the grave after searching for about two hours," Mr Struthers explained. "I don't think anyone has even placed a flower on his grave since 1907 as his family all moved away to New South Wales the very next day. The grave is very dilapidated with most of the letters missing, while the sandstone and marble have really felt

the passage of time." As the movie is about Pamela Travers and her close association with her father (referred to in the movie as Mr Banks) Les and Loraine decided to push ahead with the restoration.

"Producers, directors and cast of the movie have already sent us some donations towards restoration but we hope that our event on 27th January will allow us to complete the project." The Mary Poppins House will be open to the public on January

27 between 2pm and 5pm, where you can hear about the history of the house, stop for afternoon tea and donate to the grave site restoration project. Saving Mr Banks is currently in post production and is due for release in the US in December this year.

Animal Registration notices in your letterboxes soon

Southern Downs Regional Council advises animal owners that annual registration fees for cats and dogs are now due for the 2013 calendar year. Animal registration is compulsory under the State Government's Animal Management (Cats and Dogs) Act 2008.

"Animal registration reminder letters will be posted this week and should be in resident's post boxes by the end of the week," said Tim O'Brien, Manager Environmental Services.

"Please be sure to check the due date for payment and make sure you pay on time to be eligible for the discount," he added. Mr O'Brien also reminds residents that permits are required for the keeping of two dogs within designated town areas as set out in Councils Local Laws. The new Local Law introduced in January 2012 makes it unlawful to keep more than two dogs or cats in designated town areas, however if residents want to keep more than two dogs or cats they can make a planning application for approval.

It should be noted that residents in the old Stanthorpe Shire area who were allowed to keep more than two dogs, would still be able to keep the animals but they would not be able to replace them if they are removed from the property.

"There are many benefits to having your animals registered, including identification of the animal in case it escapes or strays," added Mr O'Brien.

"The registration tag allows for easy identification by Council officers and the quick return of a lost pet."

House to house animal registration checks may be conducted after the expiry of the discount period for registration. Fees should be paid by February 22nd to qualify for the discount. For further information on animal registrations or permits please contact Council on 4661 0300.

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15 Years of Ducks Race Tradition

The Dalrymple Duck Race needs little introduction around Allora, especially in community fundraising circles. Allora Show Society committee member and annual Duck Race organizer Ted Cowley introduced the novel event to Allora's calendar fifteen years ago, back in 1998. The first ever Dalrymple Duck Race took place on Sunday December 13th, 1998, and featured 300 yellow rubber ducks traversing the challenges of Dalrymple Creek in Stuart Henry Park. The current in the creek wasn't quite as brisk as needed to help the ducks along so members of the Allora Queensland Fire & Rescue Service provided some assistance with some high pressure water jets. That initial Duck Race was held in support of Allora Showgirl guest entrant Kate Smith, the first Duck Race winning owners being 1st Amanda Highland, 2nd Bob Locke & 3rd Sue Cowley. It's Dalrymple Duck Race time again in Allora, with event organizer Ted Cowley busy selling tickets for 400 cute yellow ducks that will take to the Allora Swimming Pool at 3.00 pm on Australia Day in what has been a novel and successful fundraiser over many years for Allora Show Princess entrants. This year the Duck Race will benefit Show Princess entrants and Allora locals Amy Young Jessica Bool and Carla Frizzell.

With the purchase of a \$2.00 ticket community members can lay claim to a duck in the big race, and should that duck cross the finish line first the winner collects an easy \$150, second place pockets \$100 and a crisp \$50 note goes to third place.

Ted Cowley, assisted by Princess entrants Amy, Jessica & Carla, will again be selling Duck Race tickets tomorrow outside Allora Pharmacy, tickets also available before the big races on Australia Day.

The Dalrymple Duck Race has become an Allora district tradition that always attracts a healthy crowd. The ducks no longer wind their way downstream on a 50 metre course in Dalrymple Creek with nature providing the momentum for the wining duck. Past Duck races in Dalrymple Creek were great spectacles, but the event didn't come without some chance of peril.

Now days the ducks do a lap of the Allora Swimming Pool with some additional incentive from a commercial grade electric fan. A move to the Allora Swimming Pool has provided a safer more comfortable venue, for ducks and spectators alike.

Demonstration & Display Day with the theme of The Dairy Industry on 20th April 2013. The following is from a series of articles telling the story of the Dairy Industry in the Allora district each week...

Time Passes By – Writings of R W Frizzell (b1885- d1964)

"...The closely settled mixed farming area of Ellinthorp district with an area of somewhere about 22,000 acres called 'Talgai West Station' was purchased by the Scottish Australian Investment Company from the late G C Clark's father somewhere about the 1900's and thence cut the area into 15 dairy farms, 14 share-farms and the Homestead block. The 14 share-farms were farmed on a 50/50 basis, the Homstead block was worked on a wages system.

The houses on these dairy farms were erected by contract. Each dairy comprised of 120 cows run on an area of between 400 and 500 acres. These cows were milked by hand on all farms which contained six cow bails, with exception of 2 farms. The milk was weighed each milking and recorded twice daily in a herd book, all cows being named and numbered and herd tested every three months, every heifer was tattooed on the ear to correspond with her dam for culling purposes. The milk was carted twice daily to a creamery to be separated. The milk was carted in carts made by the Allora blacksmith Tom Maher. The carts were large enough to hold 22 ten-gallon cans.

The creamery was situated on a farm known as 'The Rocks' at present owned by Thomas Cowley. About 1908 a new creamery was erected on the hill above the present school. Three large separators driven by steam were installed. Each farmer took his separated milk home by return, and the cream was taken by covered waggonette to the railway siding and forwarded to the Warwick Butter Factory. The creamery was managed by a New South Wales man named Sinclair".

"...Talgai West was manged for the Scottish Australian Investment Company by Aubin Dowling for a number of years (approximately 40 years). This station employed between 30 and 40 men permanently besides share-farmers, having its' own butcher's shop, blacksmith's shop (tradesman blacksmith), provision store, tradesman carpenter and own sawbench and saw timber for station purposes. Large bachelors's guarters with their own cook who baked all the bread, also a library for the employees this being large enough to accommodate 60 persons. There were 5 well built cottages on the hill situated on the property of Mr Harry Sprott which was the Homestead block.

Three horse teams worked daily - 5-horse dray teams and one 10-horse wagon, one dray driven by Jock Rix and the other by the late George Kirby. Six horse teams were used to cultivate 6 - THE ALLORA ADVERTISER ... THURSDAY, 24th JANUARY 2013

several hundred acres to grow green fodder, mainly lucerne and barley, the first being responsible for much hay-making. The teamsmen had a movable camp with their own cook . This enabled them to go to the various parts of the station with the least possible upset. The farm manager was the late Robert Crooks. They also sowed about 50 acres of maize sown by broadcast each year to provide ensilage, which was blown by blast into silos. The station ran over 200 head of all classes of horses in addition to a large number of sheep and also kept a sheep stud.

The Home Farm which was the stud farm, and all the share farms was managed by the late D C Pryce, the cattle from this farm being used as foundation stock for all the share dairy farms. The stock were bred from the famous Illawarra blood of 'Darballara' which was owned by the Scottish Australian Investment Company and well known all over Queensland. Pigs bred on this farm were Berkshire in charge of Jimmy Rix for supplying all the dairy farms. These pigs were purchased by the share-farmers when they were about 6 to 8 weeks old and were priced from 6/- to 8/- per head. The piggery covered 2 acres of land with over 100 brood sows housed in sties. One building containing 30 sties with concrete floor and water laid on to each sty was under one roof, together with various other buildings.

The cattle were stabled and fed. Two grooms attended the cattle, the head groom was the late Jack Cranitch. He held this position for many years. All the fodder and milk used to feed the cattle and pigs was carried in a trolly. Over half a mile of trolly line was set down. All the milk on this farm was separated by their own steam separator. Calves reared were all hand fed in stalls with bails for each calf to be fed from an enamel basin and rubber tube with a teat on, leading through an upright into the bail. A rack held the basins and the bails held and fed 10 calves at a time. This farm was managed by William Bly.

The average return per cow per head would be about One pound per month and this average was given great publicity in the "Allora Guardian". The pigs were not bought by weight. The prices paid from 35/- to 2 pound 10 pence per head for pigs of 180 to 200 lbs. in weight. 2 pound 10 pence was a very high price. They were fed on boiled cracked barley, pumpkins and separated milk. The pigs were trucked from railway siding when sold.

In 1912 or 1913 this station was cut up and sold to private parties and all cattle were sold at auction by the late Charles McDougall and with this came the change in name of railway siding of 'Talgai' to 'Dalrymple', a name that was confused with a station in North Queensland - and so 'Ellinthorp'. My recollections are from about 1903 onwards"



"I got my driver's license in the car, the family owned it and sold it in 1974, traded in at Austral on a VJ Valiant" said Ted, "I found it at Maryvale stored in a shed from 1985 until now, in magnificent condition and now I own the car again".

Since 2001 the Allora Heritage Weekend organisers have nominated feature machinery as a focal point of the event that attracts thousands to the Allora Showgrounds each Australia Day weekend. The successful concept has continued each year since, with 2013 featuring military vehicles & equipment, Oliver Hart-Parr tractors, Leader trucks, Mini Minor cars, Lister stationery engines & BSA motor cycles.

Leader trucks will have a particular interest to the many enthusiasts and visitors over the weekend. Leader trucks have a unique place in Australia's transport history, as they were the only trucks produced in significant numbers by a wholly Australian company. The many models offered by this firm ranged from 12 ton, 4-wheel cab-overs up to 250-ton heavy-haulage bonneted tractors, some of the most powerful road-going vehicles available at the time. Nearly 2000 trucks were manufactured between 1972 and 1984, by the company which was based in Toowoomba.

Cyril Anderson, the man behind Leader, also created such national icons as

Warwick-Allora Road closes for flood works

Repair of flood damage on Warwick-Allora Road will require the road to be closed near the John Dee meat processing plant on the outskirts of Warwick, Transport and Main Roads Downs South West Regional Director Tony Platz said.

"The road will be closed so the work can proceed safely for both the road crew and road users," Mr Platz said.

"This inconvenience will mean the work is completed in a more efficient time frame of about four months, weather permitting." Work started on 21 January to repair the embankment above the Condamine River, which was severely eroded by water running over Warwick-Allora Road, three kilometres from Warwick. Please refer to local signage for the closure dates.

Motorists travelling between Allora and Warwick will be able to detour via Lvndhurst Lane.

However, heavy vehicles must remain on the New England Highway as there is a 12-tonne load limit in place on the bridge on the Lyndhurst Lane.

Access to John Dee and surrounding businesses will be maintained with access from the southern approach (Rosehill Road).

Mr Platz said this work was in addition to the 2.3km of pavement repairs on Warwick-Allora Road currently underway between Willowvale and Upper Wheatvale Roads, and between Dalrymple Creek Road and the rail crossing, which is expected to be completed in March 2013.

Road users are advised to factor in additional travel time for their journey and reminded to obey all signage for their own safety and for the safety of other road users.



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

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WATTLES PORKERS SET CLIFTON ALIGHT



135th Allora Show – 10th oldest show in Qld.

(Researched & written by Wendy Ardrey, Hon. Sec.) On 3rd April 1878, Messrs, Cooke, Gordon & Kates started a movement which brought about the holding of a public meeting on 4th June 1878, at which Mr. Deacon was voted to the chair. At that meeting, Mr. Kates moved & Mr. Kelly seconded the following resolution that:- 'An Agricultural and Horticultural Association be formed within the Allora & Spring Creek districts in connection with the Allora Ploughing Match Committee, to be styled the "Central Downs Agricultural & Horticultural Association". The motion was carried and thus was born the predecessor of the Allora Show Society Inc.

The first few shows alternated between Allora & Clifton & included ploughing matches as well as produce displays. Early shows were held in the old Town Hall & on March 12, 1880, a proclamation was issued reserving the current site of about 20acres (8.1ha) for showground purposes. In July 1882 it was decided to hold the show in February instead of the middle of winter and the first exhibition building was built for a cost of £159.

THE WARWICK EXAMINER & TIMES - Saturday, December 31, 1904 -The tender of W. Leggatt, £185 I8s has been accepted for the erection of a grandstand on the Allora showground. As far as I can ascertain the

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grandstand was built by 1906.

THE QUEENSLANDER. Brisbane-Saturday 17 February 1906 -AGRICULTURAL SHOWS. - THE ALLORA SHOW. (From Our Special Representative.) ALLORA, Feb. 7.-The annual exhibition of the Central Downs Agricultural and Horticultural Association was held to-day under most pleasant conditions. The weather was perfect, being bright and warm. His Excellency the Governor and Lady Chelmsford and their little daughter, The Premier (the Hon. W. Kidston), the Ministerial candidate for Warwick (Mr. O'Sullivan), and several members of Parliament were present, and also about 2000 people. The pretty showground was a scene of great activity, and the side shows of various kinds did a brisk business during the day. There were 710 exhibits- about the same number as last year-but there has been a big change in the numbers for the various sections. Owing to the dry winter and spring, fruit and vegetables were not nearly so well represented as last year, but the loss in these was compensated by the increases in cattle and horses. There was an excellent display of horses. the draughts being good, and the hacks particularly so. In cattle, Mr. W. Keys was very successful with animals of a good useful type. The Holmes family swept the board for Ayrshire* with their Coolangatta strain, J. Holmes' Probity of Coolangatta taking first prize for bull, and S. Holmes' Florrie first for cow. The only classes for sheep were for butchers' animals, and they were a fair lot. R. Gordon carried off all the principal awards for swine with his well-bred stock. There were not many entries of fruit, and nothing special was shown except an exhibit of grapes by Mr. Mouldy, which were of very good colour and size. Corn is late, and the exhibits of maize were in the soft stage, but the cobs were good. A very promising feature of the pavilion was the fine display of cut flowers and pot plants, which added materially to the attractiveness of the building. There was a good entry for wheat, and H. Smith secured the blue ticket with a fine sample of Budd's Early, going 681b. to the bushel; J. Hancock being next with some Luya. In the special class for Budd's Early, a sample was shown which went 68 1/2 lbs. to the bushel. There was little in the machinery section, but displays were made of Alpha-Laval separators by Waugh end Josephson, of Melotte separators and Campbell's oil engines by Clark and Fauset; of separators by the Crown Company, and of windmills and Sharples separators by McLennan and Co.

The Vice-regal party arrived at Allora by special train, and was welcomed on the platform by the Mayor (Alderman Deacon) and a number of leading residents. An address of welcome, conveying the usual assurances of loyalty and good wishes for His Excellency, was read by the town clerk. Lord Chelmsford, in acknowledging the kindly sentiments expressed, said he hoped to be able to again visit Allora but he was beginning to learn what a large place Queensland was.

THE OPENING CEREMONY. - At noon the Governor officially declared the show open. Speaking from the steps of the pavilion, he congratulated the people of Allora on the splendid day they had for it. On Sunday he had wondered whether they would be able to hold the show. He had had a little experience of the black soil country in wet weather, and knew how difficult it was to get about. He had also to congratulate them on the splendid way everything was growing. He had much pleasure in declaring the show open. (Applause.)

In the 1960's Fr Tom McCormack introduced Stud Beef Cattle to the show. The Allora Show was used by exhibitors as a springboard for the prestigious Sydney Show. Apart from the disappearance of trotting, ring events have seen little change in the past 100 years. Until the early 1990's, Allora was one of the biggest country shows for dairy farmers with more than 200 head entered every year.

The first Allora Showgirl, Mary Donegan, was chosen in 1963 and each year the lucky winner represents Allora in the Miss Darling Downs contest in Toowoomba. Miss Allora Showgirl 19 year old Cathy Smith was selected to represent the Darling Downs at the Brisbane Ekka in the nation's Bi-Centennial year, 1988.

In 2008, the Allora Show Society Inc. made history when it took the 'bit between the teeth' by staging the first horse events programme since the outbreak of EI. Approval from the DPI was given at midnight the night before the show. Competitors were as grateful for our efforts as we were for theirs
