

Funding available to make rural communities better for young Australians

In February this year thirty-two young people from regional and rural Australia gathered in Canberra for the annual Heywire Regional Youth Summit. Together they shared their views on issues that matter to them and collaborated to refine and develop seven ideas to improve the lives of young

Those ideas were launched Wednesday (1 May) in a report about the Summit and, in an exciting new initiative aimed at making them a reality, the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR) has pledged \$70,000 to assist communities to adopt and pilot the Heywire Summit ideas.

FRRR CEO, Alexandra Gartmann, who was one of the mentors that the young people pitched their ideas to at the Summit's conclusion, said that the Foundation has partnered with ABC Radio to help bring these ideas to reality. "The way the young people collaborated around these ideas and the passionate way in which they believe they will improve the lives of their peers really resonated with us. So with ABC, we created a program that will enable seven communities to apply for up to \$10,000 in seed funding to adopt, adapt and implement one of these ideas in their community," Ms Gartmann

The ideas range from a body image campaign called Fresh Face Friday, to youth led mental health workshops in high schools, to an innovative drinkdriving campaign.

In another idea, five young women, all daughters of primary producers, came together to develop a unique way of connecting consumers and farmers.

"Our idea is to place QR codes next to fresh produce. Consumers could scan the codes with their smart phone and learn about the origin of the produce, the farmers who grew it, the production processes and maybe even about the prices the farmer received for the produce. We hope that this would ultimately help encourage better returns for primary producers. It could be the first step to ensuring a lifelong career in Australian agriculture for young people like



Looking Back... **ABORIGINES**

Following my articles on Allora aborigines in the Advertiser, John Sparksman has kindly lent his father's diaries to the Historical Society for scanning. Jack Sparksman was born in Allora in 1881 and from the 1st October 1904 to the 24th August 1907 he worked on Glengallan Station. He recorded his working life on a daily basis and added some items of general interest. On Friday 15th June 1906 his diary reads "Plough flat. Kitty died". We think that this entry may refer to the death of the last of the Allora aborigines.

William Kadow, who farmed at Clintonvale for many years, was born at Swan Creek in 1881. In 1972 in his 91st year, he recorded his memories of his early life at Swan Creek from about 1887. Although the aborigines from his memories were not those from Allora, they would probably have had similar customs and life styles.

"Aborigines came to the homes for food and to trade, and small groups went to different homes. King Billy was with the group that visited Dad's home. He proudly wore a metal plate on his chest. To rob a bee's nest the natives would urinate on their hands and rub themselves all over to discourage the bee stings. Their method of robbing a bee's nest was to cut toe holds in the trunk round and round the bole until reaching the first limb, then via limb to limb until reaching the hive. They would cut a square out of the tree trunk and extract the comb and honey and replace the square. The natives would need protection from the

bees whilst engaged in this slow work and the above antidote was the most effective means they knew. There is a lesson here for the destructive white man who cut down the tree and sometimes even burnt the tree and the unfortunate bees

The aborigines would also bring down opossums and native bears with a boomerang. They were adept at hitting this small game on the back of the neck with a boomerang even in tall trees. The womenfolk would be looking for wattle tree grubs, witchety grubs etc, and edible roots and berries, also yams. Their bark huts were in a 50 acre belt of scrub near Mt. Sturt in Wilson's paddock. Their abode was broad lengths of bark built in a pyramid shape and their beds were of gum leaves laid on the ground; a fragrant

Dad speaks very highly of these aborigines and maintains that they were fine people with high moral and strict tribal laws. When coming to homes for food they would bring various things to trade for the food and baccy. Honey was one of these items, but honey was not so popular with the Kadow's after observing how they got the honey".

Elizabeth Gray also lent the Historical Society photo albums belonging to her mother Gertie Burge (nee Gilmore) for scanning. One of the albums contained a photo of a group of aboriginal men and their humpies. It is not known where this photo was taken although it was probably not in the Allora district.

The study also pointed out that Southern Downs Regional Council provides significant in-kind assistance to the Morgan Park precinct on an annual basis by way of maintenance of common areas, road reserve and bitumen roads servicing Morgan Park. The sporting clubs have utilised assistance under Council's plant-hire donation's policy. This policy allows Clubs to receive in-kind support to the value of \$2,000 annually. Further, Council has allocated \$200,000 for the upgrade of the road access for the entrance to Morgan

The economic assessment study estimates the value of capital infrastructure of the sporting precinct is valued at \$17 million. The Warwick District Sporting Car Club alone has infrastructure estimated to be worth \$12 million on the grounds it leases. These figures exclude the value of the land. The study states that these capital improvements represent the amount of expenditure incurred on the land by each of the clubs. Where expenditure data wasn't available, an estimate of the replacement value of improvements was made. The capital improvements, according to the study, were developed over a number of years and have been derived from various sources including grants, Council loans, private donations and a significant amount of in-kind voluntary contributions from the sporting clubs and club generated income.

The study reveals that the annual total economic benefit that the Morgan Park sporting clubs bring to the Southern Downs is estimated at \$5.8 million, based on the 2011 calendar year. However the study acknowledges that this figure is conservative as not all impacts from the Morgan Park activities were included. A clear picture emerged from the study of the numbers and expenditure of competitors and spectators that Morgan Park brings to Warwick from outside of the region. The study focused on the expenditure

on accommodation, food and beverage by visiting competitors and spectators. On this basis the direct annual benefit to the Southern Downs is conservatively estimated at \$3.35 million. The economic assessment process fed this amount of direct affects into an economic modelling and software system called Remplan, which takes into account the flow on affects of money spent. Under this method the multiplier effects of this \$3.35 million raises the level of total economic benefits to the Southern Downs to \$5.8 million.

One area that study was not able to cover is the annual dollar value of the expenditure by a number of residents who have permanently relocated to Warwick because of the existence of the Morgan Park facility. One local Real Estate agent who has kept an eye on this trend is Yve Stocks. Yve has estimated that at least 200 people have moved to Warwick because of Morgan Park. Yve said that she herself is one such example, moving here because of her great interest in sports cars.


Chris and John Loy of the Warwick Drag Racing Club have been quick to point out that one of the key advantages of the Economic Assessment is its usefulness with grant applications by Morgan Park Sporting Clubs. The Drag Racing Club have recently made it to the final stage of a Regional Development Australia funding round and it is now one of five final applicants vying for grant money to enable it to greatly improve the Drag Racing

Bill Campbell, who has been the driving force behind the Warwick and District Sporting Car Club at Morgan Park, is appreciative of the economic assessment work and suggests that it is a good basis for further work in future years. Bill pointed out that there are further benefits to be included in the assessment such as the mid week activity that involves testing and training. For example, Choice Magazine employees have stayed in Warwick to undertake tests and trials mid week when the facilities are available. Bill also suggests that an assessment of the value of having new residents to the town as a result of Morgan Park needs to be included in the future studies. He said this inclusion could considerably add to current estimated value of

Les Fraser of Warwick Polocrosse Club notes that this study was based on 2011 as a typical year. He suggests that the size and types of events can vary considerably from year to year and therefore the estimated financial benefits can also vary. For example the National Polocrosse Championships held at Morgan Park in 2012, according to data collected by the club itself, brought into the district well more than \$1 million on its own as a direct benefit. He also said that that a large economic benefit occurred from the Polocrosse State Championships held recently in Morgan Park.

Andrew Roach, CEO of Southern Downs Regional Council said, "With the success of the Morgan Park facility, the Southern Downs is the envy of many regional centres."

"It's a terrific asset and draw card to have and the signs are there that the Morgan Park Sporting Clubs will continue to grow and add a good deal of value to the community and economy of the Southern Downs."


