To the Parishioners of Allora-Clifton Parish,

I have asked for this letter to be read at both services on Sunday 5th July, and for it to be displayed on both church notice-boards because tension appears to have developed between the congregations about possibilities currently being explored by Parish Council for future ministry.

When I met with the Parish Council on Tuesday 9th June to listen to their concerns about small congregations and similar styles of worship in each centre, we named a number of possibilities which could enable future growth. These included:

- things remaining the same.
- · rearranging the timing of services so that worship would be at the same time/same place each week,
- · the church at Clifton being closed so that the area had one centre for all worship and ministry activities,
- · and the possibility of one or both centres becoming incorporated into a neighbouring Parish.

My proposal was that Parish Council further discuss these and name their preferred options. Once this had been agreed I offered to write a letter that would be sent to all parishioners on the Parish Roll naming these options, and inviting feedback so that together a way forward could be agreed.

Unfortunately we did not get to the stage of inviting feedback because some people have anticipated the worst. I think this has generated some very positive conversation and feedback in the Clifton community which includes an expression of support being printed in the Clifton Courier from the Ministers Fraternal at Clifton.

Some of you may be thinking that Bishop Cam wants to close Clifton no matter what happens, but this is not the case. What I would like to see, indeed what I would love to see, is Anglican communities in each place thriving. Inspiring traditional worship done well in each place with people who love each other and nurture new people in Christian faith. Contemporary worship done well in either Allora or Clifton that enables young families and young people to express their faith. Groups in both communities that enable people of all ages to pray and learn

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together; that equip people to share their faith with those they

Loyal Orange Lodge

The members of the Purple Heart Lodge of Orangemen began their annual 12th July celebrations with a church parade in the Methodist Church on Sunday morning. The parade was very largely attended, over 70 members including visiting brethren from Warwick, Killarney and Ipswich taking part. The annual dinner was subsequently held in the Protestant Hall when about 130 persons participated. Bro. H. Allen Smith, Worshipful Master, presided and extended a hearty welcome to the many visitors present.

Allora's Past 150 years ago July 1865

District Court

James Gleeson came before the District Court in Toowoomba charged with

stealing a horse, the property of Seaton H. Dunn, superintendant of Telamon Station for the Bank of Australasia. Mr. Dunn deposed that the accused and two of his brothers worked on the property, were of a quiet nature and that he had never heard a word against them. James Gleeson had left the property claiming that he and his brother were owed £27 in wages. A short time later he missed the horse in question.

George Healy gave evidence that he was a constable in the Allora Police and had arrested the accused on the Maryvale run on the 24th March on suspicion of horse stealing. Following evidence from other witnesses and advice from the Attorney General, James Gleeson was found not guilty.

He was further charged with stealing a gelding from Glenelg on the 11th January for which he was found guilty and sentenced to two years with hard labour in the Brisbane goal.

ALLORA'S ANZACS REMEMBERED: A project by the Allora Historical Society

CYRIL ERIC MOORHEAD

Cyril Eric Moorhead was born at Bermagui , New South Wales (near Bega). He was a bank clerk aged 21 ½ years when he enlisted on 31st March 1916 in Rockhampton. He had been a Senior Cadet for one year. On enlistment he signed a statement to the effect that he had served with the Citizen Forces two years previous and had returned all the equipment. Cyril named his father John as his next-of-kin. John was then the proprietor of a General Store at Cooroy.

Cyril's connection to Allora stems from the fact that in 1911, his father had bought the business of Lound and Colclough on the corner of Warwick and Herbert Streets Allora. John Moorhread sold the business to Holmes and Co. Cyril was appointed a position with the C.B.C. Bank in Rockhampton in 1912 when aged 18 years

Private C E Moorhead, Regiment No. 374 was assigned to the 4th Reinforcement of the 11th Machine Gun Company.

On October 20th, Cyril embarked from Melbourne on the "Port Lincoln". He was transferred to the "Ulyases" at Sieria Leone and disembarked at Devonport England on 30th December 1916. He was in training at No 6-7 Camp at Perham Downs After taking ill, Cyril was admitted to No.1 Conv. Depot on 6th February for a period of three weeks. After discharge Cyril proceeded overseas to France via Folkstone on the 24th April, 1917. There he joined the Machine Gun Base Depot at Campiers and from there 'marched out' to his unit on 5th May 1917

Cyril fought at the front for a period of four months before being seriously wounded in action. He sustained multiple fractures to the legs from gunshots and died from his wounds 29th September 1917 at the 2nd Canadian Casualty Clearing Station in Belguim.

Cyril was buried at Lyssenthook Military Cemetery, 1 $^{3}\!\!/$ miles S.W. of Poperinghe, France.

Understandably many family members at home found that their letters did not reach their loved ones overseas either in training or fighting at the front. The Officer in Charge of Base Records (Melbourne) replied to many queries from family members regarding the whereabouts of service personnel.

In the case of Cyril Moorhead, Base Records replied to his father, giving Cyril's correct address and returning letters that could not be delivered to him.

John Moorhead had become the Secretary of the Patriotic Committee . This group undertook to look after volunteers and to make sure that newly enlisted servicemen got a proper send off

John Moorhead, in a letter to Base Record said that Brisbane office knew him well. He wrote asking for news of Cyril who he knew had left aboard the "Port Lincoln". John asked if the ship was safe and of his son's whereabouts.

After Cyril died in September 1917, John Moorhead was still waiting for more details of his death in March 1918. He had not been given a report of the burial of his son. His concern is evident when he writes, "Surely there must be some means of ascertaining who was with him. There must have been a nurse or doctor. It is cruel that a boy can die and be buried like a dog and no trace of his passing be found.......His brother wants now to enlist but if boys are so neglected that even their death for their country is not noticed, I must object to his going".

The Officer in Charge Base Records advised John that it was the custom when the stress of operations at the Front permitted for the C.O. or the Chaplin to write to the relatives of deceased members of the A.I.F.

John Moorhead's suffering was to continue. Base Records regrettably informed him that his son's personal effects still missing were in a consignment shipped from England per S.S. "Barunca". The vessel was lost at sea with all cargo, as a result of enemy action. John Moorhead had written to say that some of his son's belongings had been received but his wallet with important papers and his wristlet watch were still missing.

John Moorhead requested a photograph of his son's grave. In

September, 1919, the Photographic Section of the A.I.F. started to take photos of all graves of deceased members of the Force. The photos were forwarded to the Officer in Charge of Base Records for transmission to the next-of kin- concerned. He also requested a Mother's Badge and Cyril's unit colours. John was informed that it was not the practice to furnish the public with unit colours and that they could be purchased at a Military Outfitter. The colours of the 3rd Machine Gun Battalion into which Cyril's 11th Battalion had been absorbed were yellow and black in an oval of 3'x1 ½'. The yellow formed the centre measuring 2 ½'x1' with a black surround ½' wide.

SDRC's reticulated gas supply business survey now available

With economic growth and local job creation high on both the State Government and Southern Downs Regional Council's Economic Development agenda, Council has released an electronic survey for commercial, health and industrial businesses to gauge the need for a reticulated gas supply to Warwick

Mayor Peter Blundell said that a number of businesses have expressed interest in establishing in Warwick and the Southern Downs.

"The Warwick urban area is not connected to a reticulated gas service, and most businesses and industries using natural gas rely on bulk onsite storage tanks.

"A reticulated gas supply would need to be brought from Toowoomba to Warwick. In the past, desktop studies have been undertaken and the envisaged cost would be in the order of \$40–\$50 million. To justify this investment in infrastructure, companies would need to be committed to accessing natural gas to operate their businesses", he said.

All businesses interested in reticulated gas including commercial, health and industrial businesses, are encouraged to complete the reticulated gas supply survey, which can be accessed from Council's new-look website at www.sdrc.qld. gov.au. The survey is available for completion until the end of July.

Agricultural Competitiveness White Paper – a blueprint for the Allora region

Producers in the Allora region are at the forefront of the Agricultural Competitiveness White Paper which sets out the Coalition Government's vision for the sector by supporting farming families and helping them to grow their business, Federal LNP Member for Maranoa Bruce Scott said.

"Whether its meat, grain, wine, horticulture or anything in-between – the White Paper's release is the start of a new age for agriculture. It provides the blueprint for greater investment, innovation and is set to assist producers improve productivity and capitalise on domestic and international market opportunities," Mr Scott said.

"We are lowering tax, cutting red tape, creating jobs, investing in water and fencing infrastructure and the White Paper not only encourages trade by making it easier for products to reach markets but also contains funding for major roads and dams infrastructure to help boost production.

"A strong agricultural sector contributes to a strong economy and that means more jobs, greater exports, higher incomes and better services for bush communities.

"We're determined to make this sector even more competitive and deliver practical measures that will keep our producers, their families and communities profitable and resilient.

"We have already abolished the Carbon Tax and the Growing Jobs and Small Business package announced in the Budget will benefit 97% of producers."

The White Paper and the 2015 Budget deliver a better tax system for farm businesses by enabling:

- Banks to allow farmers to use Farm Management Deposits as a business loan offset, reducing interest costs estimated at up to \$150 million a year, from July 1, 2016;
- Farmers to opt back into income tax averaging after 10 years, from July 1, 2016;
- Farmers to double their Farm Management Deposits to \$800,000, from July 1, 2016;



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- · Immediate tax deduction for fencing;
- Immediate tax deduction of the cost of new water infrastructure;
 and
- Accelerated three-year depreciation of capital expenditure on fodder assets

The government will also invest \$11.4 million to boost ACCC engagement with the agricultural sector, including a new commissioner with expertise in agriculture.

"A more farm savvy and proactive ACCC will encourage fair-trading and strengthen competition in agricultural supply chains," Mr Scott said.

The White Paper also builds on this government's commitment to build water, transport and communications infrastructure of the 21st century.

"The government's \$500 million National Water Infrastructure Fund will provide future water security for our farmers," Mr Scott said.

"I have long-fought for better communication outcomes and infrastructure in the bush. My advocacy is represented in the Coalition Government's Mobile Black Spot Programme and we recently announced an additional \$60 million – on top of the \$100 million programme – to improve mobile coverage across regional Australia."

Other measures announced in the White Paper include:

- \cdot Up to \$250 million in Drought Concessional Loans each year for 11 years;
- \$22.8 million to increase Farm Household Allowance case management for farmers;
- \cdot Increased financial counselling services and improved access to community mental health;
- · Access for farmers to their Farm Management Deposits when needed, without losing tax concessions;
- \$35 million for local infrastructure projects to help communities suffering due to drought;
 \$25.8 million over four years to manage pest animals and
- weeds in drought-affected areas; and · Advice and help from the Australian Taxation Office.

Mr Scott said government is opening new export markets and will protect Australia's highly prized biosecurity status, which underpins our valuable exports.

"This government has successfully delivered the trifecta of trade agreements with Japan, the Republic of Korea and China

this will deliver new opportunities for our farmers," he said.

Budget Briefs

COMMUNITY GRANTS - Council has again committed its support to local groups and organisations by way of community funding programs including Community Grants (CGP), Community Support (CSP), Fast Response (FRSGP) and In-Kind Assistance (IKAP) to the sum of \$119,830. The major events of the region including, Jumpers & Jazz in July Festival, Warwick Rodeo, The Apple & Grape Harvest Festival and Historic Leyburn Sprints, will see a total commitment of \$71,880.

SUPPORTING THE ARTS - Council recognises the importance of a vibrant local arts community and the 2015/16 budget will support the arts locally with a budget allocation of \$515,183. This amount includes funding of \$390,000 for the Warwick and Stanthorpe Art Galleries; \$21,850 for the Stanthorpe Museum and \$103,333 for the Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF) which supports local artists and arts and cultural activities and events in Queensland regional communities. Council has this year allocated \$45,000 to RADF grant funding with Arts Queensland contributing the balance \$58,333.

LIBRARIES - In recognition of the ongoing high use of the libraries, Council continues its commitment to funding library services. In this financial year, Council is anticipating a grant of \$166,000 plus a co-contribution from Council of nearly \$9,000 for the purchase of resources. This will cover the cost of all library stock in various formats, such as standard and large print books, audio books (CD and MP3), music CD's, magazines, children's books, eBooks, eAudios and learning resources available online.

CIVIC EVENTS - Civic events continue to be a priority for Council with a commitment of \$33,383 included in the budget for Carols in the Park, Australia Day and Anzac Day in both Stanthorpe and Warwick.

PARKS - A total of \$1.7 million has been budgeted for the provision of parks and gardens operations and maintenance. Council places a strong emphasis on the amenity of the region as well as providing safe outdoor areas and play equipment for children and families.

POOLS - An allocation of \$480,000 has been budgeted for the Stanthorpe Pool Sand Filter Replacement project (\$280,000) and the WIRAC Pump Refurbishment Project (\$200,000).

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AERODROMES - Council will upgrade the electricity supply to the Stanthorpe Aerodrome with an allocation of \$200,000 from the budget. A further \$188,000 has been allocated towards the operations and maintenance of the Aerodromes.

CEMETERIES - A total of \$1.66 million has been budgeted for operating and maintenance costs of the region's cemeteries.

SALEYARDS - Council has allocated \$748,000 for the operation of the Saleyards. In addition, \$100,000 has been budgeted towards completing safety improvements identified in the Warwick Saleyard Masterplan 2014.

ASSET IMPROVEMENTS - Council has budgeted approximately \$2.99 million in the area of water and waste water targeting asset remediation and improvement across the region. This includes an allocation of \$682,000 for the water main growth extension from Stanthorpe to Applethorpe, and \$260,000 for wastewater pump improvements.

ROADS AND BRIDGES - Bridges are a key component of Council's road network and as such Council has allocated funds towards several important bridges. A total of \$6.79 million, including \$4.71 million in State Government funding, has been allocated to the Lyndhurst Lane Bridge, Mullins Road Bridge, Bellingham Road Bridge, Sandy Creek Road Bridge and Tummaville Road Bridge, Berat Forest Spring Road Bridge and other special bridge works. The budget also contains \$1.2 million for gravel re-sheeting and \$1.05 million for re-sealing of roads throughout the region.

PEST MANAGEMENT - Council has budgeted \$931,000 for pest management operations throughout the region. Council has allocated funding of \$31,000 for upgrading of the Killarney Wild Dog Fence (\$11,000) and the Stanthorpe Wild Dog Fence (\$20,000), continuing the commitment to combating the problems caused by wild dogs in the region. Bounty payments for wild dogs are again being provided by Council to assist in the control of these animals.

WASTE SERVICES - There has been \$475,000 allocated in the budget for completion of the Northern Granite Belt Waste Transfer Station.

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COUNCILLOR CALLS FOR CUTS, CUTS AND CUTS TO ANNUAL BUDGET RATHER THAN BIG RISES IN RATES AND CHARGES



Jamie R. Mackenzie: Councillor -Southern Downs Region

At the Special Meeting of the Southern Downs Regional Council on 2 July 2015, Cr Jamie Mackenzie did not support adoption of the 2015/16 budget as it effectively resulted in average increases well over 10% for water supply and sewerage charges. The general rates rise is almost double that in most of the surrounding regional councils' rate rises of around 3% this year.

"Continual large rate rises without cutting Council's expenses is not the answer" Jamie said. "Without cuts.

this budget is the 'same old, same old' and it will therefore not get my support."

"It seems every year that we keep raising rates by reducing discounts" Cr Jamie Mackenzie said. "This is unsustainable and is getting beyond ratepayers' capacity to pay."

"Our message months ago to the Mayor and bureaucrats was to keep rates at CPI levels and to cut, cut, cut and keep cutting expenses to reduce debts. But it seems we have been ignored, despite hours of meetings behind closed doors" Cr Jamie Mackenzie said.

"Instead, in this budget, the Mayor proposes an overall increase in operating expenses exceeding \$2.5 million even though we remain on the 'medium-watch list' Cr Mackenzie said. "It is hard to justify any rate increase above the CPI index when there has been a 15% increase in wages for accounting staff and higher consultancy fees, materials costs and community grants."

"It is not what we spend Council money on, it is about how we spend it. No one wants jobs cuts in essential coal-face services like libraries, swimming pools, road gangs, parks, town water and the front counter staff, but I remain unconvinced that major cuts cannot be made in upper level administration" Jamie said.

"The Mayor's budget that removes the annual discount for prompt payment of water and sewer charges will make it particularly hard for our urban ratepayers struggling with economic downtown and the rising cost of living" Cr Mackenzie said.

"Forced amalgamation has caused the wages bill to skyrocket so that we are now top heavy with administration" Jamie said. "Front line services and fundamental day-to-day maintenance need to continue but, small business operators like me know that when times get tough, it is time to re-deploy staff. This is happening in other regional councils."

"Once again, we did not get to discuss in open budget an alternative to the budget cutting all increases to below 5% to save the rates discounts. There are many areas that could be cut including large budgets for legal action in the planning arena along with development assessment staff hours when applications are down. Staff could instead could focus on better customer service for development proposals and achieve more efficient delivery of capital works such as water supplies, footpaths and bridges."

"At least we making our opulent plant and equipment last longer."

"It is amazing that the budget was presented behind closed doors and once again we were denied the opportunity to debate it publicly and transparently in accordance with the legislation."

"Councillors need to give a little too when it comes to cutting expenses" Cr Jamie Mackenzie said. "I see no need for \$27 000.00 for councillors' conferences and another \$10 000.00 for councillors' entertainment expenses. I'll happily provide my own healthy lunch at meetings and bring a plate when needed, as community groups do in the bush. I can think of a lot of offleash dog facilities, tree planting, painting, road signs, area promotion and community projects at home that could be done instead."

"All these small savings may have repaid some loans, saved the annual discounts and allowed us to complete footpaths in Allora now on hold despite that Council still is charging 5% more general rates than last year.

"Nothing in the Mayor's budget shows how we will reduce debts. There is very little to show for the millions borrowed by Council."

"Of great concern is the \$1 million dollars of estimated income from road works contracts when we have seen no signed agreements with clients. My concern is that Council will be down another million dollars in the 2015/16 year."

Southern Downs Regional Council Mayor, Cr Peter Blundell, said Washpool camping reserve is located at the southern end of the Leslie Dam and offers a local alternative for families considering taking their kids camping in the school holidays. "With Washpool Reserve located at Leslie Dam, there are plenty of outdoor pursuits on offer for the whole family.

"There's a boat ramp available, so families can enjoy fishing, canoeing, sailing and for those keen to brave the water, there's water skiing and swimming. There's also an abundance of



kangaroos, birds and other wildlife at the reserve. Something for everyone," he said.

Washpool Reserve has 33 powered sites, allocated on a first in first serve basis, and a number of non-powered sites. Hot and cold showers and toilet facilities are available, and camp fires are permitted in the drums provided at the Reserve, but visitors must supply their own wood.

"Families can enjoy roasting their marshmallows over a campfire and creating long-lasting memories at Washpool Reserve," the Mayor said.

National Landcare Programme arrives on the Darling Downs

Condamine Alliance is happy to announce that the National Landcare Programme Regional Funding Stream is now live on the Darling Downs.

This funding stream will invest over \$454 million through Australia's 56 natural resource management organisations (NRM) over four years and will allow Condamine Alliance to lead regional planning and prioritisation of environmental protection and sustainable agricultural practices work.

This planning will link local priorities to the Aichi Targets under the Convention on Biological Diversity which Australia is a signatory to and will provide recognition for the work done by the local community in the Condamine catchment landscape.

There are specific targets for the Condamine catchment to achieve between now and June 2018.

These include reducing the threats from pest animals and weeds; conservation and sustainable use of biological diversity; maintaining natural cultural assets and applying sustainable practices in agriculture.

"It is great to have more freedom than before to involve local groups and individuals in deciding how our community can play a part in national and international scale commitments for environmental and agricultural land management," Condamine Alliance CEO Phil McCullough said.

The first of a series of small grant on-ground projects worth \$85,000 will be considered through an expression of interest process being run by Conservation Farmers Inc.

Other small grant rounds will be released in July and August for Landcare, environment and indigenous communities.

This project - Building Sustainable and Productive Agricultural Communities and Landscape in the Condamine Catchment will be looking for land managers to participate.

SDRC labour force figures

The most recent financial year has seen Southern Downs Regional Council reduce its labour force to numbers that are below both pre-amalgamation and amalgamation levels.

At the end of June 2015. Council employed approximately 340 people across the region. This compares to 370 staff in 2014, 366 in 2013, 380 in 2012, 393 in 2011, 366 in 2010 and 368 in 2009. As part of the amalgamation process there were 359 staff employed and prior to amalgamation Warwick Shire Council employed 255 staff, while Stanthorpe Shire Council employed approximately 110 staff.

It is likely the number of staff at Southern Downs Region Council will further diminish over the next few years with many staff being close to retirement. The Council and senior management are following a strict policy of replacing from within wherever possible when a position becomes vacant, as well as re-evaluating the need for every position that becomes

The Mayor, Cr Peter Blundell, said "We have a great group of people working for Council. Their commitment, dedication to work and expertise guide us in our decision making processes, as well delivering real outcomes and services for the community. Like any organisation though, Council must ensure that costs are kept down, and some of the most considerable costs are employee costs. Managing and supporting an effective and suitably sized workforce is a key element to ensuring consistency with the long term financial sustainability of Council."

In relation to the current size of the labour force, Cr Blundell

said, "I believe that we are getting close to the right number; there are always efficiencies that can be looked at or new ways of doing things. It is good to know that the labour force is at the lowest level that it has ever been in the history of Southern Downs Regional Council."

The Mayor went on to say, "In the next 12 months a review will be conducted on each business unit and service of Council to ensure that it is a service that is appropriate for Council to deliver and this review should identify further areas for savings and efficiencies.'

The size of the Southern Downs Regional Council labour force is comparable to a number of other local government authorities. For example Scenic Rim Council with a population of 37,780 (does not provide water or wastewater services) employed 355 staff in 2014, whilst South

Burnett with a population of 35,753 employed 308 for the same year. Southern Downs Regional Council has a population of approximately 36,000.

Cr Blundell said that "managing the size of the labour force will be a key challenge for the existing and future Councils and the impact of employee costs on the budget is significant, but

"Our second half wasn't quite as venomous, not everything went our way, but at one stage we defended seven sets in a row on our own line which is a remarkable effort."



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


Gilmore Boys Compete at State Championships
