Our Matthew tries for Rio

Several weeks ago, Allora's Matthew Denny became a dual Australian Open athletics champion as a result of his win in the hammer and discus at the Australian Athletics Championships in Sydney. In the hammer event, he threw 68.44m to win gold by 1.8m. His throw of 60.47m in the discus competition won him the gold medal and the title. However, it does not guarantee him a place in the Australian Olympic team for Rio de Janeiro in August as the qualifying distance for discus is 65m.

Matthew has decided to concentrate on the discus competition as he is much closer to achieving the qualifying distance in this than in hammer. He would still love to throw the hammer in an Olympics event but for now his concentration will be on discus. Following the Australian Championships, Matthew flew to the United States in order to enter competitions in an attempt to throw the qualifying distance there. He has until July to achieve

this goal. In competition at Sahnas, California, he threw a personal best of 64.01m, sensationally improving on his Australian Championships effort. Last Thursday he further improved on that with a 64.73m throw, bringing him tantalizingly close to his 65m target.

Last week Matthew won the Daily News/Warwick Credit Union Senior Sports Star of the Year award at a gala dinner in Warwick. His father, John Denny accepted the award on Matthew's behalf. In his response from the United States, Matthew said he was honoured to receive the award.

"I congratulate all the monthly award winners and thank the Warwick Credit Union and Warwick Daily News for their support of the awards," he said. "I was sorry I couldn't be there but I am on a mission to throw an Olympic qualifier."

Matthew is Allora born and bred and he has worked very hard and made many sacrifices to reach this impressive level in his sport. If he is selected in the Australian Olympic team, he will

Greenlandic Foods

As part of our studies of Greenland this year, QCWA Allora has been learning about the foods eaten by the Greenlandic people. Their cuisine is quite different to our local experience. Until the 1980's most Greenlandic people ate the traditional foods caught or hunted from the sea and the land. Although the advent of grocery stores has meant changes to the country's diet, fish and sea food still represent the base of the cuisine. The most popular ingredients are walrus, seal, fish such as cod, whale meat, and the tastiest parts are considered to be the eyes, kidney and the heart. Local dishes also include shrimp and crab. Fish are dried and frozen outside on lines and racks. Greenlandic shark is eaten as a delicacy, being poisonous unless subject to fermentation in the ground for several weeks.

Land animals such as the reindeer, musk ox, arctic fox, polar bear, and caribou are all part of the traditional menu. The liver of the reindeer is eaten raw immediately after the hunt. Lambs are a relatively new addition to the diet and are slaughtered once a year in September/October and the meat distributed through the island.

Many fruit and vegetables are imported from Denmark, although more vegetables are being farmed locally with the increase of 3 extra weeks growing time due to global warming. Greenhouses are also used to grow more local produce. Berries are picked in the summer.

The national dish is Suaasat, a thick soup of boiled seal meat with onions, rice, potato, or barley and a few herbs. Reindeer meat, whale or sea birds can be substituted for the seal. Our QCWA lunch will feature a tasty Christmas version of the Suaasat with beef instead of seal!


Anzac Day

Anzac Day, April 25th, the anniversary of the landing of Australian troops at Gallipoli was commemorated in Allora by proceedings of a most impressive character. Special services were held in the various churches in the morning at which large congregations were present. The right note appears to have been struck in most cases. The occasion was not one for anything in the way of celebration, nor was it altogether a memorial. It was a commemoration in the strict sense of the word, a day set apart in honour of the part played by our gallant
