The first three caused minor disruption but more than 2 million forms were successfully submitted and safely stored.

After the fourth attack, just after 7.30pm, the ABS took the precaution of closing down the system to ensure the integrity of the data.

Steps were taken during the night to remedy these issues, and I can reassure Australians that their data is secure at the ABS. ABS would remind Australians that they have plenty of time to complete the Census, to well into September, and again note that fines will not be imposed for completing the Census after Census night.

completed. When such abuse is suspected, the case will be treated in the same manner as a 000 phone call- as a priority emergency.

When the system isn't working to keep our children safe and frontline officers are stretched to the limit, it seems everyday Queenslanders are left to send a strong message to those in charge and stand up for our most vulnerable.

In 18 short months, Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk and her Child Safety Minister Shannon Fentiman have allowed our child safety system to run down.

Between June 2015 and March 2016 investigation backlogs have blown out, with more than 71 percent of all children whose cases should be investigated within five days not being seen in time

Under Labor's watch, the number of children whose cases aren't being investigated in the allowed two months has now risen to almost 50 percent.

Today we have more than 9000 children in out-of-home care, many of whom have suffered extreme trauma, leaving our hardworking foster carers under increasing pressure with no relief in sight.

Two of the biggest reasons for these delays are the lack of frontline staff and the increasing complexity of the cases being investigated.

In 2013, the LNP inherited a broken system that we set about repairing through the Carmody Inquiry. During our last 18 months in Government things were getting better. The system was far from perfect but we were working on it and getting results. Since then, the situation has gone from on the mend to being stretched to breaking point.

What's even more troubling is the admission that the independent Families Commission charged with holding the system to account admits it hasn't even seen performance data from the Department.

How can the body responsible for keeping the child protection system accountable do its job if it is blind to the faltering system?

Over 25,000 Queenslanders can see the system is clearly broken and failing our children. How many more of our

Darwalla To Build New Hatchery

Consistent with our strategy to transform Darwalla into a more modern, innovative operation we are finalising arrangements for the construction of a new hatchery at Allora. This investment in technology, equipment and infrastructure will ensure we remain cost competitive and prepared for the future growth of our customers.

We are both proud and excited to finally make this announcement after the considerable effort that has gone into planning over the last year. The new facility, to be located on the outskirts of Allora near Warwick, will be completed by mid 2017. As a greenfield site it will be a quiet, clean and green operation designed to integrate into its natural surrounds.

Darwalla is proud to be working with Badge Constructions to construct a state of the art facility incorporating the latest technology from Petersime.

The new Allora hatchery will comprise of a 5000m2 building, 600 metres from an entry off Bradfield Road and will process up to 800,000 live chicks per week in the final phase. The building will be purpose built for energy efficiency, comprising the latest heat recovery technology to minimise carbon emissions. Heat energy produced by the chicks will be harnessed to create heating and cooling.

The Allora operations will be conducted almost entirely




undercover in a purpose-built, self contained facility specifically designed to minimise radiated noise and odour. Around 60% of its workings will comprise hatchers and setters where fertilised eggs will be maintained in a controlled environment behind sealed doors until chicks are hatched.

Darwalla has worked closely with the local Council to ensure this operation delivers significant economic benefits to the Southern Downs region and the local Allora community. We

have also consulted with current hatchery staff to ensure that they were the first to be told about this plan and to offer them priority in seeking employment in the new hatchery. We have also offered support for those that choose not to transfer and incentive for those remaining in the current hatchery until production ceases.

We will keep you all informed of this project's progress as it occurs.

Water meter readings to start next week

Southern Downs Regional Council Water Officers have begun water meter readings across the region from Monday, August 15 and will continue until approximately mid-September 2016. Southern Downs Regional Council's Manager Water and Wastewater, Mr Tendekai Mapeza, has urged ratepayers and tenants to ensure their water meters are easily accessible to meter readers.

"Check your water meters are free from debris, grass, garden mulch, soil and other obstacles.

"As ratepayers, you are responsible for water infrastructure on your property's side of your water meter, including leaks in pipes or fixtures.

"If meters and stop taps cannot be located easily, water damage to your property and the cost of water consumption could escalate," Mr Mapeza said.

In the event property gates are locked or animals prevent Council Officers accessing residents' water meters, a calling card will be left in the letterbox asking residents to contact the Council Officer who attended the property to arrange access. Water notices are scheduled to be issued in early October 2016

150 years ago

Queensland **Government Gazette** August 1866

Publicans Licenses Issued 22/8/1866 Erhart M. Queens Arms Hotel Gordon S. Prince of Wales Hotel Roggenkamp M. Dalrymple Hotel

Of the three hotels trading in Allora in August 1866, only one is still trading 150 years later on the same site, albeit in a new building and under a different name. The Princess of Wales Hotel in Raff Street burned to the ground in 1954, four years after being sold by the Gordon family. The Dalrymple Hotel at the northern end of Raff Street ceased trading in 1868 when Martin Roggenkamp was declared insolvent and no further license was issued.

The above notice was the first to appear in the Government Gazette for the Queens Arms Hotel. Michael Erhart purchased the one acre block on the corner of Drayton and Herbert Streets on the 29/11/1865 and on the 7/7/1866 signed a mortgage for a loan of £500 from John Clark Swanton Hegarty to build the hotel (John C. S. Hegarty was an Allora storekeeper and not to be confused with John Hegarty, an Allora farmer and ancestor of the Back Plains and Pampas Hegarty's). In 1870 John C. S. Hegarty was in financial trouble and the mortgage was taken over by Francis Kates a rival

storekeeper.

The license notices for Michael Erhart and the Queens Arms Hotel appear in the Government Gazette up to 1875 when the license may have lapsed for a short time. In newspaper advertisements between 1876 and 1878 George Lochel, Christiana Erhart (Michael's wife), Henry Gwynne and James Stewart all applied unsuccessfully to be granted the license. In 1879 Charles Henry Wills, formerly manager of East Talgai, purchased the hotel. The name of the hotel was changed to the Royal Hotel and leased to Patrick Kelley from 1880 to 1883. Patrick Kelley was the first of four generations of his family to hold the license over the years. John Holmes purchased the Royal Hotel from C. H. Wills in 1884 and in 1891, after a five year lease of the hotel to John Kelly expired, added a second story. The license was held by David Holmes at the time of his death in 1897. John Holmes died in 1901.

Ellen McCormack (formerly Kelley) took up the license in 1903 and began a nearly 60 year association between her family and the Royal Hotel. Ellen (by then the wife of James Edward Flynn) died in 1912 and the freehold of the hotel was held in trust by her brother, William Owen Kelley, and her cousin, Thomas Maher, for her only daughter, Mary Josephine McCormack. The license was held during this period by several people including John Thomas Marshall and George Ellis who both have descendants still living in

A Certificate of Title in the name of Mary Josephine McCormack was issued on the 11th October 1927 following the finalization of her mother's estate. Mary McCormack married Daniel McKendry in 1928. The Royal Hotel burned to the ground on the 10th May 1931. The hotel was rebuilt and Mary McKendry took over the license operating it until 1946 with Jeremiah Collins who she married following the death of Dan McKendry in 1932. Jock McKendry, Mary's son, was the licensee from 1954 to 1957, making him the fourth descendant of the Kelley family to hold the license of the Royal Hotel. The hotel finally passed out of the hands of the McKendry family when it was sold to George Johnston in 1962.

On the 10th February 1986 Dayline Ptv. Ltd., with Denise Dalgleish as nominee, took over the Royal Hotel. Although Denise cannot yet match Mary McKendry in time of ownership of the hotel, she is approaching the record of 32 years set by Sarah Clarke as licensee of the Princess of Wales Hotel. Following a trip to the Snowy Mountains about 1996, Denise changed the name of the hotel to the Blue

Cow Hotel.



Gerontology key to future of Australian society

Australians are living longer, challenging society to take steps to better support a growing ageing population.

To improve our understanding of life for older Australians, the University of Southern Queensland (USQ) offers a number of gerontology programs, delving into the study of ageing, including the process and societal and medical implications.

USQ intends to expand on this suite of course offerings as part of USQ's School of Psychology and Counselling commitment to provide degrees focused on community needs.

Enter Professor Bob Knight, an internationally renowned gerontology expert new to the USQ community.

Professor Knight spent nearly 30 years at the University Of Southern California School Of Gerontology - a world leader in the study of ageing.

With more than 100 journal articles, chapters, and books, Professor Knight has published extensively on the topic of mental health and ageing, with a particular focus on psychotherapy and caregiving.

He is also the editor of the Journals of Gerontology: Psychological Sciences; authored the book Psychotherapy with Older Adults and co-authored Psychological Assessment and Therapy with Older Adults.


He has now brought his wealth of expertise and experience from the US to Australia and USQ.

"Gerontology is a multi-disciplinary field and has emerged to become a discipline in its own right, focused on studying developmental ageing and also looking at older adults as a specific population within society," Professor

"In the US, it's been an integrated field of study spanning biology, physical medicine, psychology, sociology and social policy - many kinds of approaches. But I think elsewhere in the world, including Australia, gerontology has been a more distinct area focused more on social science and social policy rather

than psychology geriatric medicine.

"There seems to be a much more positive focus on mental health in Australia compared to the US. Organisations such as beyondblue and what they do to get the word out about clinical depression anxiety fascinates me."

Professor Knight said he was very pleased to join the USQ team, both as an educator and researcher.

"We are developing gerontology focus within the School of Psychology and

Counselling, working to increase the focus on older adults in the USQ psychological clinic, and I am involved in a range of research programs," he said

"For example, I am developing a scale to measure wisdom using online data collection by recruiting people of all adult ages and am particularly interested in involving middle aged and older adults.

"I'm also working on a couple of grants - one focused on cross-cultural differences in family caregiving for frail older adults, and the other looking at treating anxiety for people with Parkinson Disease.

"USQ is a supportive environment and it'll exciting to see what we can accomplish here."

The Australian Government's 2015 Intergenerational Report, an assessment of the long-term sustainability of current Government policies and implications of Australia's population size and age profile, stated the country's population is projected to change and grow over the next 40 years.

This included predictions that the number of Australians aged 65 and over will more than double by 2054-55, with 1 in 1,000 Australians projected to be aged over 100.
