

Condamine Alliance opens small grants round

Natural resource management (NRM) group Condamine Alliance is seeking project ideas from catchment landholders and groups to secure grants of up to \$10,000.

Open to landholders and community, Landcare and Indigenous groups across the Condamine catchment, the Small Grant round aims to support on-ground work that aligns with targets and priorities set out in the Condamine NRM Plan.

Condamine Alliance General Manager, Programs, Andrew McCartney said they are looking for a variety of project ideas to be delivered before 31 May 2017 that focus on the priority areas of sustainable agriculture, weed and pest management, environment, Indigenous cultural assets and/or water quality.

"We currently have small grants of up to \$10,000 available through funding acquired from the Australian Government's National Landcare Programme and the Queensland Government's Queensland Regional Natural Resource Management Investment Program," said Mr McCartney.

"Targets we are looking to meet include tackling weed species like Bridal Creeper, Harrisia Cactus, Devils Rope Pear, Giant Rats Tail, Chilean Needle Grass and Honey Locust. And we are hoping to reduce the impact of pest animals like deer, wild dogs and pigs, rabbits, feral cats and Indian myna birds," he added. The NRM group is also looking for projects ideas that support improved water quality, especially around riverine condition, ground cover and riparian vegetation.

"Projects centered around land management, including soil heath, climate change, ground cover, soil carbon, biodiversity, and water and nutrient optimization are also of key interest," said Mr McCartney.

Interested individuals and groups are encouraged to express their interest online via the Condamine Alliance website (www.condaminealliance.com.au) before Friday 27 January 2017.

Successful parties will be required to enter into a formal contractual arrangement, capture and report project monitoring data, record and share spatial information, complete reporting through online portals, and demonstrate the capacity to deliver projects as contracted.

Allora's Past 75 years ago January

Queensland Casualties

Private Glvnn Munro Holmes of Allora was reported as seriously ill on the casualty list released on the 2nd January 1942.

(Glynn "Buff" Holmes enlisted in the A.I.F.

on the 17th June 1940. He was allocated to "D" Company 2/26th Infantry Battalion. After training, he embarked with the battalion for Malaya where he was transferred to 2/30th Battalion. Buff was taken P.O.W. on the 15th February 1942. He spent time in Changi prison camp before being sent to work on the Burma-Thailand railway with "A" Force. After the Japanese surrender on the 15th August 1945 he returned to Australia and was discharged on the 12th February 1946)

Allora's Past 150 years ago January 1867

Death of a Doctor

The inquest into the death of German doctor, Charles Sassadius, was reported in the Warwick Argus of 2nd January 1867. Dr. Sassadius who had practiced on the Talgai Goldfields for some time, had for the last 6 months been a resident of Allora. He was not Allora's first doctor as stated in "Allora's Past", as Dr. Henry Ramsdale had owned a farm close to the

town from about 1860 to 1864.

The inquest heard that on Thursday, 27th December, 1866, a man on Pilton Station had broken his leg. John McDonald, an employee of Pilton Station, was sent to Allora to fetch Dr. Sassadius. On reaching Allora he was told that the doctor was at the Talgai Reefs. McDonald reached Pratten on Friday morning and in company with Dr. Sassadius returned to Allora on Friday evening. Along with another man, Frederick Westermeyer, they set out for Pilton. The doctor carried with him a small bottle that was three parts full on leaving Allora and from which he several times stopped to drink from.

The trio stopped at Gillam's Clifton Arms public house at Spring Creek where they drank two bottles of porter. About 21/2 miles beyond McIntosh's public house at Spring Creek, after frequent sips of the small bottle, Dr. Sassadius fell from his horse. (They would have then been in the vicinity of Saddletop as the road from Spring Creek to Pilton travelled along the high ground to skirt Clifton Station). Westermeyer and McDonald decided to sleep for 11/2 hours until the moon came up, and on waking found that the doctor was dead.

They waited until daylight when Westermever went to Allora to report the death to Acting Sergeant Gravson. McDonald waited for a dray to convey the body to Allora where a post mortem was carried out by Dr. Margetts of Warwick. William Gillam, son of the licensee of the Clifton Arms hotel, rode to Pilton to inform them of the death of Dr. Sassadius. Dr. Margetts found that the deceased had died from congestion of the brain, brought on by the excessive use of intoxication liquors, combined with the immodest use of laudanum.

Dr. Charles Sassadius was buried in the Allora cemetery where his grave was marked by a simple wooden cross.

Banks must release FMD offsetting options now: Littleproud MP

Federal Member for Maranoa David Littleproud has called on the major banks to match Rural Bank's new Farm Management Deposit (FMD) financial offsetting product to help producers reduce their interest costs.

"Although the Coalition Government made the necessary changes in 2016, the major banks are still not offering offsetting options to farming customers and given the huge potential this has to help farmers with their interest bills each year, this inaction really concerns me," Mr Littleproud said.

In appearing before the Economics Committee's Review of the Four Major Banks – NAB, ANZ and Westpac were reluctant to say whether they'd offer offsetting options, citing it was too complex and costly to change their systems.

Mr Littleproud said the fact that Rural Bank has created this product demonstrates the major banks had given nonsense excuses, and that greed was the only reason banks were reluctant to create this product for their agribusiness customers. Offsetting already commonly exists in home lending but Mr Littleproud believes the major banks' reluctance to create this product was more likely about preserving the higher margins charged on agricultural loans over home loans.

"The Australian Bureau of Agricultural and Resource Economics and Sciences (ABARES) estimates these offsetting accounts are likely to reduce the interest rate burden by \$150 million and, in my view, farmers are being left high-and-dry by their banks," he said.

The major banks also raised the legal complexity in offsetting a loan account in the name of a corporate entity or trust with the interest accruing in an FMD account, which is required to be held in the name of an individual.

However, Mr Littleproud confirmed this initiative is confined to family farming operations which are predominantly operated by an individual or under a partnership structure.

"There are nearly four times as many of those enterprises in the agricultural sector, than there are trusts or corporate entities and this is about preserving the family farm for generations to come", he said. Mr Littleproud has written to all registered FMD scheme financial institutions that have not yet created an offsetting product, seeking answers as to when they expect to release their first FMD offsetting product to eligible farming customers.

Stanthorpe Civic Centre works steaming ahead with revised program

The restoration of the fire damaged Stanthorpe Civic Centre is steaming ahead with a revised program that will see works now due for completion in March.

Southern Downs Regional Council's Manager Community Services and Major Projects, Michael Bell, said that while there has been some reduced progress over the last couple of weeks, this was largely due to many of the construction firms and suppliers closing over the Christmas/New Year period.

"This is not an unusual or unexpected occurrence and is one that generally happens at this time of year.

"However, with the extent of the damage being greater than initially anticipated, this has caused a few headaches, as the program has had to be adjusted to take into consideration the sourcing of specialised stage materials, air conditioning equipment and the reconfiguration of some elements of the design.

"With contractors now back on site, it is full steam ahead to get this community facility back open, with a revised completion date now expected to be in early March 2017," Mr Bell said. Southern Downs Regional Council appreciates the continued patience of the community during the reconstruction period and apologises for any inconvenience caused.

Council advises Warwick's discoloured water poses no health concerns

Residents accessing water from the Warwick town water supply last week and over the weekend may have noticed some discolouration; however Southern Downs Regional Council assures residents that there are no health concerns with the water.

Southern Downs Regional Council received notification about the discoloured water on Tuesday last week, and 17 calls have been logged about the matter to date.

Council's Director Engineering Services, Mr Peter See said that the water has some colouring which is believed to be due to chlorine oxidising manganese in the water after it has been filtered, but emphasised that the discolouration is no cause for alarm.

"The discolouration is a result of a harmless chemical reaction occurring at the water treatment plant after the water has passed through the filters.

"There is no health or safety concern caused by the discolouration. The water is safe to drink and there is no risk to health.

"The water is treated to the required health standard, the water quality health parameters are tested continuously at the treatment plant and there have been no instances of non-compliance.

"Council is aware that the water currently being produced is discoloured and the matter is being addressed. Actions to rectify the situation are being assessed, and we anticipate that the water should be restored to normal within the next few days," Mr See said.

The water discolouration issue also attracted considerable attention in social media. In light of this, Mr See reminded residents about the appropriate way to lodge a request about a matter like this with Council.

"It's important for the community to note that just because there may be conversation in social media about an issue like the discoloured water, it does not mean that Council is automatically aware of it or has received notification about it.

"Notification of these sorts of issues or requests for service should be lodged with Council direct through our 1300 MY SDRC number or via our MY SDRC App to ensure that they are picked up in our system for appropriate action," he said.


