




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The Allora Cup - Some Beginnings

After a lull of around 45 years, the sound of a bugle ringing out "Call to Post" was heard once again for an Allora Cup horse racing meet in 2014, marking the rebirth of the race meet named in honour of the "Best Little Town on the Downs".

That Railway Hotel Allora Cup Race Day meet was hosted at Warwick's Allman Park by the Warwick Turf Club on Saturday, February 1st, the main race that reignited a tradition won by Daryl Peckett's 'Ain't She Sweet.'

Allora's big race day gets underway again on Saturday in Warwick, the fifth time it has been run since it's re-emergence. The 2016 Allora Cup meet was to also be a celebration of 150 Years of racing history in the Allora district, alas wet weather saw the event canceled and rescheduled early this year.

Some may not be familiar with the former Allora Race track to the south east of the town neighbouring the New England Highway. Many a great day of racing was held on the track amid the 62 hectares that is now leased for agriculture. The track is now maintained by the Southern Downs Regional Council as a race horse training facility.

Racing has a lengthy history in the Allora area dating back a little over 150 years. In February 1866 a meeting was held in the Taylor's Reef Hotel at Pratten to organize the Talgai Races just west of Allora.

A race meeting on New Years Day 1869 could have been the first organized horse-racing meeting in Allora, the press reporting "On Saturday afternoon last a very good day's sports was got up at this quiet little township, when six races were set down for decision. There was a very good attendance of visitors, and the races were well contested."

The 150 acre Allora Racecourse Reserve was gazetted in August 1871, with race meetings held on an irregular basis, and in August 1883, the Allora Municipal Council was appointed trustee of the reserve.

A public meeting was called on October 6th 1888 at the Princess of Wales Hotel, for a formation of a club to organize racing in Allora on a more regular basis. The Allora Jockey Club was formed with the first registered race meeting held on Boxing Day 1889, the main race being the Allora Turf Club Handicap with prize money of 25 sovereigns.

Over the next 60 years horse racing in Allora had many revivals. Because of the siting of the track, wet weather caused the postponement of many race meetings.

The cancellation of the 1891 meeting saw interest wane in the district until the club was reformed in May 1893. In 1895 interest again lapsed, although St. Patrick's Day races were held for unregistered horses only and a Boxing Day race meeting that year was organized by the revived Allora Jockey Club.

The next fourteen years saw regular registered meetings organized by the A. J. C.

The Allora Amateur Race Club was formed in 1909 with Edwin Cowley as secretary, and ran the Boxing Day races in 1909 and race meetings in 1910.

The Oddfellow's Amateur Race Club was formed in 1911, but the A. J. C. was again revived in 1912.

The First World War years saw restrictions on horse racing in Australia and "Patriotic Race Meetings" were held from 1916 to 1918.

The Allora Digger's Race Club was formed in 1926 and organized race meetings for a short time.

The year 1929 saw the revival of registered race meetings in Allora after a twelve year break. The main race at the September 1929 meeting, organized by the A. J. C., was the Allora Handicap won by F. W. Grimes' "Miss Semirg" (Grimes spelled backwards).

By 1934 racing enthusiasm had again waned and the Allora Shire Council said that they would only spend accumulated funds, if race meetings were held at more frequent intervals than those since 1930.

Racing may have been suspended in Allora during the Second World War, the first reference to a race meeting after the war was a New Year's Meeting held on the 2nd January 1949.

The first "Allora Cup" appears to have occurred at a meeting held on October 8th, 1949 when the cup was run for overall prize money of £45 and a cup valued at £10/10. The race club secretary in 1949 and for the next eleven years at least, was the Allora railway station master, Jack Hilton. The winner of the inaugural Allora Cup was 'Nobleman' owned by Tom Cowley, trained by Dick Byrne and ridden by Joe Murphy.

In the following year, 1950 the Cup was won by R. C. Crowther's "Bon Ami".

In 1953, the Cup winner was the mare "Plane" owned and trained by Frank Armstrong, and at the presentation of the 1955 Allora Cup, won by Frank Armstrong's "Lurcher Queen", Allora Jockey Club secretary, Jack Hilton, said that Mr. Armstrong apparently had "a mortgage on the cup because it was the fourth time that he had won it."

Local racing historian Shirley Murray recalls that the cup meeting was a huge event in Allora with a half-day holiday granted. Top race caller, Vince Curry, would call the races from the back of a utility backed up to the course fence.

From 1956 the Allora Cup was run on Melbourne Cup Day, the winner that year being "Bubbatonga" owned by Bob Armstrong. The final Allora Cup meeting before being reinstated in 2014 appears to have been run on the 3rd November 1959.

The reintroduced Allora Cup occurred twice in 2015, relocating from its initial February date to November.

Allora locals turned out in force on Sunday November 15th 2015, at Warwick's Allman Park, soaking up the sunshine at a hugely successful 'Railway Hotel Allora Cup' won convincingly by five year old bay gelding, 'Real Favulous'.

Clifton based owners Adrian & Julia Simmons and their son Shane Simmons were thrilled with the performance of 'Real Favulous' who was having a cracker of a year after enjoying success in the 2015 Weetwood Handicap.

Sunshine Coast-based owner and trainer Rob Davidson took home the Allora Cup run in January this year with his six-yearold mare 'Air Diamond'.

Other key races close to the hearts of the Allora community last November were the 'Justin Briggs Commemorative Class 3 Plate' and the 'Colleen Burgess Memorial Benchmark 65 Handicap' sponsored respectively by Robyn Miles of Allora's Railway Hotel and Allora district racing identity Barry Burgess. The September 2017 'Railway Hotel Allora Cup' festivities begin in earnest on Friday evening with a Calcutta at the Railway Hotel featuring horses in the race day five race program.

"The program strives to get Queensland's older population online with confidence and to help them engage in the digital world so they can connect with friends and family, and access vital services."


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Allora C. 1900 Early Day Pastimes:

While dealing with the pastimes of the early days, we mustn't forget the old-fashioned picnic: it was always a popular eventalthough there wouldn't be many starters if one was suggested today.

Good Queen Victoria was our Sovereign Lady on the day and her annual birthday was always loyally and joyously celebrated as a Public Holiday. The 24th May was Queens's Birthday later, after her death, it became Empire Day, later still Commonwealth Day until now, I imagine, it is just an ordinary day like any other day and its history almost forgotten. But in the early days, "24th May Picnics" sprang up like mushrooms all over the district - at Hendon, Spring Creek, Kings Creek, etc.- but the one I remember best was held at Harrison's Pocket, off the Goomburra road. [near the Dalrymple Creek at



the end of the road near the pump station]

Families drove out from town and farmers gathered from near and far: spring carts and buggies, on arrival, were quickly tucked away under the trees and their first job was to "clear the space" - to roll away the logs, and knock down any saplings

Looking Back...

What's in a Name?

In the last month the Allora and District Historical Society has received two family history enquiries where the person involved has changed their name.

John Few was born at 'Spring Creek near Allora' on the 16th June 1867. The Clifton Agricultural Reserve at Spring Creek had been resumed by the Government from Clifton Station in 1867 and broken up for sale to small selectors. Allora would have been the nearest town. John Few's parents, John senior and Frances Few (nee Webb), had arrived in Australia from England in 1855. Six children were born in N.S.W. before John's birth in Queensland. The family returned to N.S.W. where more children were born. John Few junior appears to have been bought up in N.S.W. where there are newspaper reports of him serving two short jail terms for assault and riotous behaviour. He is also reported as being a member of a concert group.

Sometime in the 1890's he turned up in Charters Towers in Queensland under the name of John Cosgrove. He is reported in the 'Northern Miner' newspaper as being in 1901, the year that he married Kate Flannagan. Twelve children were born to this marriage before John's death in Ingham in 1924. His death certificate gives his parents as John and Frances Cosgrove (nee Webb). Was Cosgrove his stage name or was he the black sheep of the family who moved interstate and changed his name?

The other enquiry involved Francis Henry Newman who married Jane Hadden in Brisbane in 1878. Francis Henry Newman is shown on the Allora Municipal Council rate books as owning land at Allora in 1879 under the name of Francis Henry Nutley. Nutley was his mother's maiden name. There are many newspaper references to the Nutley family living in the Allora district in the fifteen years to 1894. Francis Henry Nutley is recorded on the Cunningham electoral roll for 1882 as a farmer living at East Talgai. Four children were born at Allora and registered in the name of Nutley.

Henry Nutley is also reported to have been a sergeant in C Coy, Queensland Defence Force (Warwick). In this capacity in 1885 he was part of a military delegation that inspected the site offered by Robert Cooke for the building of a rifle range at Allora. He was the first to fire a shot on the new range when he hit a tree 9ft from the ground at 600 yards. He was present at the meeting called in 1886 to form the Allora Rifle Club and was elected to the first committee.

An amusing case took place in the Allora Police Court in 1888 where Sergeant Henry Nutley was the complainant. The Bench consisted of Messrs. Deacon, Easton and Kennedy, Justices of the Peace. The incident took place in the Salvation Army Hall in Allora and Henry Nutley was described as a private soldier in the Salvation Army. The defendant in case was John Cameron, a son of Allora's first Town Clerk, Alexander Cameron, and Mrs. Cameron. John Cameron presented himself to the court as 'Colonel' Cameron of the 'Skeleton Army', an obvious dig at the Salvation Army's use of military titles for its leaders. The charge was disorderly behaviour in a place of Divine Worship. Henry Nutley deposed that he was hit by corn seeds when he was kneeling in prayer. On looking around he saw John Cameron in the act of throwing more seeds. Frederick Gibson and Frederick Erhardt who sat on either side of Cameron. gave evidence that they did not see him throw any seeds.

The defendant was found guilty by the majority of the Bench, Mr. Kennedy being against, and fined 1/- in default 24 hours in the lockup. The fine was paid but by the time the Bench sat down to decide costs of court, the 'Colonel' was gone. (John Cameron went on have a distinguished career in the Queensland police Force) In the Clifton Divisional Board rate books

1891-1894 F. H. Nutley is described as being the occupier of a farm at Table Top, owned by Edward Harvey. An advertisement appears in the Allora Guardian for the sale of 10 acres of corn belonging to Henry Nutley.

On his death bed in the Brisbane Hospital on the 21st December 1894 Henry signed a will in the name of Henry Newman leaving his possessions to his wife Jane.

that were in the way: then build a fireplace and store the food "away from the ants".

And then, apart from the pleasure of meeting and gossiping and one would say that, after all, this was the main purpose of the picnic- some sort of programme was drawn up. There always appeared to be a great number of children at these gatherings - it was a poor family that didn't have at least half-adozen and some ran to considerably more - and of course they had to be catered for. And to marshal those kiddies into any sort of order was no mean feat: for ten minutes after they arrived, those youngsters had scattered to the four winds and were nowhere in sight. But after dragging a couple out of the creek, and getting a few more out of trees and rescuing those who had managed to get into the fire, they were finally got into some sort of line for the "races". These went off with the usual flurry and were followed by the Married Women Race and the Old Buffers Race and the Three-Legged Race - all with the hilarity and fun that such simple pastimes seem to cause. In those days too there were various old-fashioned ring games which the adults enjoyed as much as the juniors - but he'd be a brave man today to suggest them to any grownup party, and anyhow, we've forgotten even how to run them.

But of course, the principle feature of the day was the "outdoor spread." For this, cloths were spread on the ground in one great circle and the eatables were quickly spread on it: and if Mrs. Smith quietly eyed the jam tarts that Mrs. Kerr brought, or Mrs. Rickett thought that her rock cakes were far superior to those of Mrs. Collins, not a word was said- until the good ladies were on their way home.

And if the parson was at the picnic - and it was remarkable how he found it convenient to come along - it was the rule, before the meal started, for everyone to be upstanding, form a circle and sing Grace.


And believe me, dear readers, it is something that stays in one's memory - the recollection of some 20 or 30 or 40 good simple folk standing in a circle, under the gum trees at Harrison's Pocket, all singing, in tune or out of tune, but very fervently rendering an old-time "Grace before Meat" - and I wager that it's something Harrison's Pocket will never see again.

But by now the billies would be boiling and the tea buckets filled- and it's a case of "Please pass the scones" and "Won't you have a jam tart?" until the board has been well and truly cleared.

Justice having been done to the meal, various couples sorted themselves out and went a wandering along the creek banks as couples have done in all ages: a few old hands tried their hand at casting a line into the creek, but if ever a fish was caught at Harrison's Pocket, I've yet to hear of it, for, long years ago, my brother and I spent many useless hours sitting on its banks, buoyed up with hope, - but returned home empty handed.

But one feels that the days of picnics are over and that more





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modern pastimes take their place for we live in a fast changing world - but sometimes it is worthwhile to look back for a moment, and to enjoy in retrospect the simple and homely pleasures of other days - and regret their passing.

Domestic Violence Support

If your daughter, sister or friend was living in a constant state of terror and fear of domestic abuse, would you offer your spare room to help her out?

It's easy to take for granted the fact we have a comfortable home to return to at the end of the day but as we know this isn't



the reality for thousands of women across Australia. And for many people a support network just isn't available, as you can see from these statistics:

· Over 105,000 people are homeless every night across Australia,

If we can provide them with a safe, secure place to go within a supportive environment, even just for a few days, we are confident we can help break the cycle.

We want people in the community to open up their homes to help those who find themselves in abusive relationships before those relationships turn violent.

Showing of purebred dogs has been important part of Australia's culture since emigration from England.

According to records, the first dog show in Australia was help in

Hobart, Tasmania, in 1862 with the purpose to educate the public on the useful breeds of dogs.

Through Australia's civilisation, the importance of livestock is clear. Hence, dog showing became an integral part of agricultural shows as time went on. In 1870, the National Agricultural Society was formed which included the exhibition of some dogs and also poultry.

Dogs Queensland General Manager, Rob Harrison, said the dog show is an important event in a pedigree dog owner's calendar.

"The show is a wonderful event, not only for our members but also the general public who have the chance to chat to the owners and breeders, and watch the judging," Rob said.

"Family and friends from the local community are invited to come down over the weekend to show their support for the much-loved breeds."
