Local Legend Remembered

Ted was born in 1940 to Tom and Beth Cowley in Allora.

He grew up on his parent's farm at Ellinthorpe with his sisters Helen and Anne (dec'd.) and his brothers Michael and John, in pretty typical circumstances for the war and post-war years. He told stories about not having conveniences like electricity or the telephone on until later in his life.

Ted played and refereed football for Allora into his twenties, and that worked out well for him when he took his brother Michael to the hospital after a game and met the matron Sue Armbruster. Apparently, he couldn't stop talking about her, and asked her to marry him a few short and exciting months later and they soon moved into a house across the creek from his boyhood home.

From early on Ted was a performer. After school he started singing and playing saxophone in local pubs and halls, sometimes for a little money and sometimes just to contribute to the community. And no matter how late he was out or how much fun he had, he was always up in time for milking the next day.

As for his career, Ted often said he had wanted nothing else but to be a farmer. He started working on the farm as soon as he was old enough, and helped Tom and John work the farm until Tom's death in 1975, at which point Ted and John took it over and worked the farm in partnership. Ted continued farming until an accident forced his early retirement in 1991.

After that Ted retired by degrees. What never stopped was the work he did for the community. This started early

with the work he did for the Apex club and at working bees for various church and community groups, but what he is best known for are his decades of work for the Allora Show Society following in the footsteps of his great grandfather, grandfather and father.

Ted - dad - had a heart big enough to fit Allora inside, and that's pretty much what he spent his life trying to do.



One of Ted's favourites was the Duck Race. He would spend considerable time sorting, laying them out, checking their numbers - he would have ducks everywhere. We would refer to this as Ted mustering his ducks. He would then spend days selling tickets in the steet.

It is in the show ring where he will be missed the most. He had an association of 70 years, first competing at age 8 and then helping his father Tom who was also a great supporter of the show. Ted remained involved Ringmaster from 1976 to 2014, then Patron until his passing. Ted was known for his tucker wagon, no Steward or Judge ever left his ring hungry.

Vale Ted Cowley - Through thick and thin he soldiered on. Ted started in the Allora Show Ring as a young boy in 1948 and continued his association with the Show Society in a voluntary capacity. One of the major problems Ted had to contend with during his time as Ringmaster of the Allora Show was the time the Equine Influenza was recognised at Morgan Park in Warwick; a situation that brought the horse industry to its knees. Allora was the first show during this time to work through all the restrictions; bringing to mind the saying 'the Show must go on'.

It is 50 years since Apex was chartered in Allora & Ted helped organise the Inaugural fund raiser for Apex. In 1976 Apex ran the White Elephant

Auctions at the Showgrounds. These Auctions evolved into today's Allora Community Auction.

Ted organised many functions

over the years - Cabarets (for the Medical Centre) then continued Jazz Nights with the Caxton Street Jazz Band for ten years. The inaugural New Year celebrations commenced to fund the Allora Medical Support Group and continued on to the present year for the benefit of the Allora community. The Dalrymple Duck Race became an Allora tradition for 21 years for the Show Girl contest. The Duck Race no longer winds its way downstream on a 50 metre course in Dalrymple Creek. The year the creek dried up

One of Ted's ventures was a horse drawn carriage which was for hire for weddings, market days & other events. Allora residents & visitors will remember many an enjoyable night in December travelling around viewing the Christmas lights. Ted enjoyed various roles in the community from Allora Hospital Board member to Santa Claus for the Creekside Carols.



Artists Sought for Downlands Art Exhibition

The Downlands Art Exhibition in Toowoomba is seeking ten new artists for its annual show in September.

Emerging and established artists are invited to apply by 14 July to exhibit in the region's largest annual art show on 22 to 29 September 2018.

The Downlands Art Exhibition features over 1.000 works in a variety of media encompassing oil paint, water colour, ceramics, photography, sculpture, jewellery, installations, print making and drawing.

For the first time, the Exhibition is part of the official Toowoomba Carnival of Flowers program and it has been extended from two to eight days.

All pieces on display are available for sale, with the Exhibition being the primary fund raiser for the Parent and Friends' Association which supports Downlands student learning

According to Evan Hollis who has curated the Exhibition for the past 11 years, introducing new artists is a way of broadening the mix of works on display.

"Exhibiting artists are generally by invitation only, so it's a rare

opportunity to open this prestigious show to new artists from around the Darling Downs and beyond," he said. "I am looking for a high standard of execution in traditional or contemporary art and something that will appeal to our buyers.

"New artists will keep the show fresh and ever-changing - we have some patrons who attend and purchase each year, either for investment, for home decorating or just because they love art."

This we wish to impress on growers sending us samples of tobacco. At least three to five lbs. are necessary to arrive at a correct conclusion. By sending a few leaves the aroma of the article is lost, and the growers defeat the very object they have in view when corresponding with us.


