

Members have been busy storing and moving the collection to the building. It is hoped that the SDRC will assist with the removal of large heavy items if deemed necessary by the removal firm

Asbestos contamination source identified as Allora Waste Transfer Facility

As a part of recent enquiries into low-level contaminated soils located at Collegian Junior Rugby League field and Warwick Central State School, Southern Downs Regional Council can confirm the Allora Waste Transfer Facility was identified as a source of asbestos contaminated material which was purchased by an external contractor to make top soil.

Workplace Health and Safety
Queensland (WHSQ)
confirmed the presence of
asbestos at the Allora Waste
Transfer Facility after
inspecting the site as a part of
ongoing investigations into the
matter.

Upon becoming aware of the presence of asbestos, SDRC took immediate measures with initial remediation works taking place at the site. Other parts of the site have been sectioned off and are awaiting further remediation works.

Until works are completed at the Allora site, only general waste, green waste and cleaned containers eligible under the Drum Muster Program will be accepted. Operating hours remain unchanged.

Initial investigations into the presence of the asbestos at Allora indicate some users have unlawfully disposed of asbestos material at the facility. Asbestos is prohibited at all SDRC waste facilities, except for Warwick and Stanthorpe. SDRC is currently reviewing its waste management procedures and practices and is working closely with WHSQ to undertake a number of measures and to ensure all workplace health and safety obligations are fully met in the future

SDRC has engaged Building and Asset Services (BAS) to assist in managing the site remediation at the Allora facility. The site will undergo a range of remediation activities to ensure it is compliant under the Workplace Health & Safety Act 2011.

Should the community have questions or concerns about receiving contaminated soils, they should contact their local supplier in the first instance to confirm the source of material used in the soil. Questions should then be directed to WHSQ or Council.

Southern Downs community to share ideas on \$1M in funding at Drought Relief Forums

The community is being called upon to put forward its ideas on how \$1 million in Federal Government funding is best spent to benefit the Southern Downs in the face of drought. Drought Relief Forums will be hosted by Southern Downs Regional Council at Warwick Town Hall on 11 September and Stanthorpe Civic Centre on 14 September 2018.

Earlier this month, the Federal Government announced it would boost the Drought Communities Program by \$75 million and provide initial support of \$1 million to 60 eligible councils, including SDRC.

The funding provides shortterm support to communities to build resilience to the drought's long-term impacts. The grant will provide

The grant will provide assistance with local employment opportunities, supporting local businesses and suppliers; encouraging economic activity and assisting with drought-relief initiatives.

The funding is subject to

Federal Government guidelines and projects must be completed by 30 June 2019.

The drop-in forums will provide an opportunity for the community and businesses to engage directly with Council, contribute ideas and provide feedback and suggestions on how to spend the funding.

Service providers and droughtrelief agencies will be on hand to assist with important information.

SDRC will also launch an online Drought Relief Funding survey on its website on Monday, 3 September for those unable to attend the forums.

Southern Downs Mayor, Tracy Dobie said Council would work with the community to ensure the funding delivered projects which would be of most benefit to the entire region.

"Council wants to hear the community's ideas and suggestions on how we use this important funding to ensure we are resilient to both

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the immediate and potential impacts of the drought," Cr Dobie said.

"We are asking all residents, businesses and community groups, everyone across the Southern Downs, to drop-in to a forum in either Warwick or Stanthorpe and share your ideas.

"It is important that as a community we think about how we allocate this funding to deliver meaningful projects and initiatives, which keep our local economy strong, boost employment and provide drought assistance where it is most needed."

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SDRC lends a hand to drought-stricken farmers with \$90k reduction in fees and charges

Drought-stricken farmers are set to receive a helping hand Southern Downs Regional Council as drought conditions worsen.

At its general meeting on Wednesday, Council resolved to waive more than \$93,000 in Council fees and charges to practically assist local farmers and producers, including:

Sale of organic material from waste facilities Hire (domestic) • of spray equipment unit (pest management)

Infrastructure Replacement Levy - Cattle, sheep, horses and goats (saleyards)

Southern Downs Mayor, Tracy Dobie said Council recognised the pressures being faced by local farmers and was undertaking a number of initiatives to minimise the impacts of drought.

"We've discussed this extensively and we know our farmers and producers are

feeling the impacts of this terrible drought; that's why we are finding practical ways to assist them," Cr Dobie said.

"Several farmers have spoken to me and other Councillors about how they would like Council to assist them. We've taken that advice on board and implemented some of those changes.'

SDRC will host community workshops to address drought funding support in the near future and is also working with the Red Cross to collect funds on behalf of Rural Aid.

Cr Dobie said Council was responding to the drought with a number of measures and initiatives, while developing its Water Efficiency Plan to manage water resources into the future

Drought Disaster Management Plan is also being developed in partnership with other government and support agencies.

Wattles at Grand Final



Local league heroes 'National the Farmers Warehouse'

Wattles Warriors top grade side were denied a fifth Toowoomba Rugby League premiership on Sunday at Toowoomba's Glenholme Park when beaten by the Valleys Roosters in the dying minutes of the 2018 Grand Final.

Considered among the most captivating season deciders of the past two decades, Valleys took full advantage of a glut of first stanza possession to lead 16 - 6 at the half time break, over TRL Minor Premiers Wattles.

In the 60th minute of play the Warriors centre Nick Van Der Poel fielded a Travis Burns kick across the Valleys goal mouth to score giving Wattles a 22 - 18 lead in a fiercely contested match between the undoubted two best teams in the TRL competition.

With just three minutes remaining on the match clock and Wattles still grasping their four point lead, the Roosters found a corridor wide on Wattles left side, five-eight Jake Ryalls sending the ball wide to 19 year old centre Kalemb Lamb who crossed for the Grand Final winning try.

The final minutes were fast

and furious and while the Warriors were in a position to reply and snatch the game, the final siren eventually beat them allowing the victorious Roosters to hoist the prestigeous Hutchies/ Chronicle Cup and the Hart Family Trophy as 2018 Toowoomba Rugby League A Grade Champions at the completion of the 99th TRL season

The win was the 35th A Grade premiership won by Valleys since their initial honours in 1911.

Valleys five eight Corey McGrady deservedly won the John McDonald medal as player of the match, and inspirational performance in attack & defence. The Roosters dominated play

in the initial forty minutes having raced to a 16-0 lead by the 15th minute courtesy of tries by centre Jarryd Dodd, back rower Hugh Sedger and front rower Dexter Buchanan. The match opened with a horror start for Wattles, an error from Valleys kick-off by the Warriors saw the Roosters in possesion deep in Wattles territory before Dodd crashed over in the 2nd minute of play. Consecutive penalties had Valleys on the charge and Wattles back peddling before Sedger touched down to see the Roosters mover ahead to lead 10 - 0.

Trailing 0 - 16 Wattles halfback & player coach Travis Burns provided an opportunity through a 40/20 kick in the 17th minute. Second-rower Ty Gardner appeared to score as he was tackled just short of the try line and momentum carrying him over, but the try was denied ruled a double movement

Valleys were reduced a man in the 24th minute when Hugh Sedger was sin binned for high tackle infringements.

Despite being a man down the Roosters defence were well up to the Warriors challenges. Sedger returned as halftime approached, and just in time to see Wattles climb on to the scoreboard.

Wattles first points came off a very high kick put up thirty minutes out by Burns that resulted in Jake Hargreaves gathering under pressure and scoring with an amazing effort for the Warriors to trail 6 - 16. Wattles errors, especially late in the first half, were taking there toll as was forty minutes of defence as they tried to quell the spirit of the possession rich Roosters.

The second half restart openeed another volotile forty minutes of outstanding rugby league and also signalled the start of a Wattles resurgence. Three unanswered tries saw the thrust of the match turn favouring those in green and gold, resulting in Travis Burns' Warriors eventually leading 22-18.

In the sixth minute of the second half Burns fired a pass to fullback Jackson Green on the fly who sent centre Nathan Gaulton down the sideline to

Vallevs kicker Brett Seymour was on target with a penalty goal in the 49th minute to have the Roosters ahead 18 -10, but Wattles returned volley through a try by Andrew Richardson.

Five-eight Hargreaves kicked to the corner from 20 minutes out where TRL Colt of the Year Richardson won the chase to the ball for the Warriors to trail 16 - 18

Wattles final try in the 61st minute was a superb play, again from a Burns kick precisely on target to drop in the Valleys ingoal. Valleys Dylan Chown and Warriors centre Nick Van Der Poel contestied the kick with Van Der Poel winning the challenge.

Sunday's big match was an epic grand final in every way, which had the crowd that included a huge Wattles contingent, on their feet throughout.

Former Newcastle Knights Chaiman and player and former Wattles five-eight Robert Tew said the game was the best country rugby league game he had seen.

"The quality of the game was unquestioned and both teams left nothing in the tank."

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
