Drought of extension officers hurts the bush

It'll come as no surprise to farmers that Labor's vegetation management laws are starting to bite, with managing vegetation and feeding drought affected livestock becoming harder and

To make a bad situation even worse, Labor is refusing to fund the extra extension officers which are needed in the transition to these unfair laws.

The Palaszczuk Labor Government's own members told Natural Resources Minister Anthony Lynham to put on more staff to work with farmers.

But all we've seen from Mr Lynham is the establishment of a glorified call centre. It is no substitute for boots on the ground.

This Labor government doesn't understand vegetation management and it won't even fund the extension officers needed to help farmers wade through the mountains of bureaucratic red tape they created.

It's particularly outrageous when you consider this has occurred during a government hiring spree.

An extra 25,000 public servants have been employed since 2015, most of which have been hired in the state's southeast and none of which have been employed to help farmers.

The red-tape keeps coming, but Labor won't help farmers untangle it.

Only the Liberal National Party has consistently opposed Labor's anti-farmer vegetation laws, which have thrown scientific consensus out the window to appease a green ideological

The Hidden Side of World War I

The Western Front during the First World War was a place closer to hell than any man has ever been but a new novel by Australian author (and former Warwick resident) Tony Matthews tells the story of an incredible struggle for survival. The soldiers fighting in the trenches at that time were faced with not one, but two murderous enemies: the German forces facing them No-Man's-Land comprised their principal foe but there was another insidious adversary and this was the British military system itself.

A Dawn with no Birdsong has been inspired by real historical events. Few people today know of the hidden statistic of the First World War but it is a fact that the British were callously executing their own soldiers and members of their allied forces at the rate of one man approximately every four days for the entire four years of the war.

November 11 this year marks the 100th anniversary of the end of the First World War but one of the least known aspects of the war is that 121 men serving with Australian military forces were sentenced to death during the conflict. many of them just country lads who had volunteered for service without really knowing what they were letting themselves in for.

The Australian Government during the war banned the use of capital punishment and no Australians were legally executed with the exception of several who were serving with the New Zealand or South African military forces. One man, a former miner from Dubbo, was shot arbitrarily without trial after he had refused to carry ammunition

known to have been shot to death on orders from a superior officer.

A Dawn with no Birdsong delves deeply into the policy of the British military in executing soldiers misdemeanours such as sleeping at a post, shellshock, striking an officer, and other similar 'crimes'. During the four years of war a total of 346 men were executed by British firing squads for just such offences.

Some of the victims were as young as seventeen years. Most of the executed men were subsequently pardoned posthumously by the British Government but for many decades the families of those soldiers had been forced to live with the shame and ignominy. Additionally, the men who had been forced to form the firing squads also had to live with their actions, and the quilt never left them. Some in later life committed suicide.

'A Dawn with no Birdsong is a novel.' Tony Mathews says. 'but it is also an examination and, I hope, a powerful indictment of the British military system of field punishment at that time. I wrote A Dawn with no Birdsong as a tribute to all those soldiers who were killed unnecessarily by their British masters.'

In 2001 the poignant 'Shot at Dawn Memorial' to the executed men was unveiled at Alrewas. Staffordshire. England. It is a stark memorial depicting a statue, some eight feet in height, of a blindfolded soldier standing waiting to be shot. The statue was created by British sculptor Andy DeComvn.

Tony Matthews is the author of thirty published books. He

The site was reopened at 8am last Thursday.

Acting Manager Environmental Services Leo Jensen said users were urged to respect

"These items pose a health and safety risk to other users when they visit these compounds.'

"Such verbal abuse is quite unnecessary," Mr Jensen

and not following some simple conditions of use, the Pozieres Bin Compound was closed which inconvenienced all users.

"Council's waste team has strived to remedy this site as soon as possible so as to ensure disruption was kept to a minimum.

Southern Downs Regional Council has organised a oneof-a-kind gathering in an effort to co-ordinate drought relief efforts across the region.

Last Wednesday saw more than 50 people from nongovernment organisations, the banking sector, not-for- profit organisations and government agencies attend an inaugural inter-agency meeting in Dalveen

The meeting was devised after recent community consultation forums were held in Warwick and Stanthorpe, which showed a need to coordinate the large amount of different types of support available within the community, from Queensland Country Women's Association's \$7500 assistance packages to smaller amounts and help with household bills from organisations such as Condamine Headwaters Landcare Group.

Southern Downs Mayor Tracy Dobie said the outcome from the meeting was to develop a comprehensive list of agencies and understand exactly what

funding opportunities or services each could provide to the community.

"It's likely a lot of families suffering from the drought across the region aren't aware of just how much help there is out there and just accessible it "Hopefully now we have compiled this list of options for families, people will find it easier to see how they can make their lives a little easier "This is all about making a difference to the community and also letting all of the agencies know what each other are offering."

Further meetings are planned, the intent of all organisations collaborating achieving simplified processes for the community. The Southern Downs region was drought declared in May 2018 and on August 18, the Federal Government announced the region was one of those in line for a \$1 million funding boost.

Experts Offer Advice on Upcoming Exams As year 12 exams loom and students hit the books. education experts provide advice on preparing for exams

and dealing with stress.

"It is not too late to learn a bit more" - Professor Andrew Martin, University of New South Wales (UNSW) Andrew Martin is Scientia Professor and Professor of Educational Psychology at the School of Education of UNSW. He highlights that students still have an opportunity to improve their chances in upcoming exams.

"Before major exams, the focus starts to shift to doing practice exams," Professor Martin. "As students mark or assess their answers. they will benefit from looking closely at "mistakes" and seeing these as windows of opportunity for improvement.

"Even at this stage, it is not too late to learn a bit more, better understand some aspects of a subject, improve one's writing, and so on. Importantly, as revision is done, keep the mobile phone out of the study area and switch off social networking and gaming if working on a computer.

"Finally, get some decent sleep and do some physical activity during this period."

"Students and their families should stress less about exams" - Dr Rachael Jacobs, Western Sydney

"Students often feel like their whole lives and futures ride on ATAR exams." said Dr Rachael Jacobs, an expert on assessment in the arts at Western Sydney University.

"The news images of students in desks and chairs, isolated from each other, exacerbates community stress around high-stakes exams.3

In Dr Jacobs' view, the stress surrounding exams is out of proportion. "The reality is that students and their families should stress less about exams and learn to adopt good learning habits every day. Most assessment is now done during the school term. Students who are better at performance or desian. creative tasks can take subjects which have more focus on projects.

"Finally, no student should ever feel that their future is dependent on one set of exams. We have more university places than ever before. Employers are looking for more than good results. Good results don't guarantee jobs and happy lives. Success can come from the unlikeliest of places.'

"Study is not just a matter of rote recall" - Dr Penny Van Bergen, Macquarie University

Dr Penny Van Bergen, a Senior Lecturer in Educational Psychology at Macquarie University, provides some tips on the best ways to prepare. "Contrary to popular belief, study is not just a matter of rote recall," she said. "Instead, experts highlight four key study techniques that will maximise your performance and learning."

"First, elaborate. Expanding on and organising material (e.g. by asking questions, making mind maps) results in

"Second, test yourself. A robust finding in cognitive psychology is the "testing effect". which shows that students perform better on exams if they have previously practised retrieving the same knowledge from memory in a similar way.

"Third, mix up your study sessions for different subjects. Experts call this form of study "interleaved study", and it leads to stronger learning outcomes than focusing on one subject at a time.

"Finally, don't cram. The evidence is in, cramming the night before an exam is not as effective as studying for the same duration over a longer period. Whether you have 10 hours or 100 hours spare, the brain works most efficiently when sessions are spread out and there is time to consolidate all the new information."

"Normal to experience nerves" Associate Professor Viviana Wuthrich, Macquarie University

Viviana Wuthrich is a clinical psychologist, and an Associate Professor of Psychology at Macquarie University. She highlights that it is "normal to experience nerves in the lead up to major senior school exams." As such, she advises students and parents to "keep the pressure to excel in

"We all want to do well, but the key is to not blow the consequences of the exam out of proportion," she said. "Secondly, balance study with rest time, and look towards life after the exams.

perspective."

"Some students (about 1 in 5) experience particularly high levels of stress, but the majority experience moderate levels of stress

Students who are more likely to experience stress at other times are most at risk of heightened distress during major exams. Heightened distress is also associated with perceived pressure from teachers, parents or students themselves to excel.

Exam stress appears to be lessened by strong family, peer and school connections, and an absence of negative thinking about consequences of exams."


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
