

Dear Editor,

Follow up on "Locals Get Excited Over Traffic Change

Following this story it is worth knowing the full details and reasons for the current traffic change. Forde Street comes under two different authorities, from north down to Warwick Street comes under SDRC and from Warwick Street south comes under Quensland Main Roads (TMR).

For many years residents of Forde Street have been concerned at the volume and speed of heavy vehicles on Forde Street especially after GrainX got extended trading hours and the Quarry trucks were operating roughly between 4am until 11pm. There is an additional issue with the section of Forde Street that has been changed which is trucks going over a poor road, making houses shake, leading to items falling off shelves and pictures moving.

An earlier petition was done and neither the then SDRC nor TMR did anything about it, SDRC alleging that they did not know which part of Forde Street they were responsible for! Finally in February 2017 I obtained clarification from TMR about which part of Forde Street came under SDRC and very quickly engineers from SDRC inspected this section of road and declaring that it needed full resurfacing, not just temporary fixing, that would need to be budgeted for. In the meantime SDRC erected temporary 40kph signs as the Homestead Aged Care Complex was in the middle of this section of road.

DRUG RAID RESULTS IN TRAFFICKING CHARGES - A Stanthorpe man has been charged with a number of offences following action taken by police at Allora last week. On Monday 7th January, Allora Police intercepted a vehicle on Raff Street at about 2pm. A search of the vehicle resulted in a 23-years-old Stanthorpe man being charged with allegedly possessing what was considered to be a commercial quantity of methamphetamine (ice) and drug utensils. As a result of that incident. a search warrant was obtained and the following morning (Tuesday), Police from Allora and Clifton raided a Herbert Street residence. At that address, the same man was arrested and charged with one count of supplying a dangerous drug, namely methamphetamine, and two charges of allegedly trafficking MDMA and cannabis. He will appear in the Warwick Magistrate's Court at a later date.

Finally in March 2018 after we made the current mayor Tracy Dobie aware of the past and present situation we had a meeting with her and one of her engineers where they proposed as a stop gap measure to install road narrowing bags at either end of the section, but again these were totally ignored and very quickly damaged such that they were effectively non-existent. Eventually the current more substantial and legal road narrowing plus plenty of good signage (CHANGED TRAFFIC CONDITIONS, full 40kph signs) was installed at either end of the problem zone shortly before Christmas.

Despite some negative comments, plus plenty of support. and one unsavoury letter to ourselves, the majority of traffic is adhering to the new traffic conditions, and there seems to be far fewer heavy vehicles passing through such that it is serving its purpose. I would further comment that in all the years we have lived here, I have not been aware of trucks passing each other from different directions on this section of road. As Sargeant Grace has said "people driving through the area need to be aware of these changes to the road design". Since the final repair bill to "fix" this section of road is estimated to be in the order of \$200,000 the best thing people can do is to continue to lobby SDRC to ensure funding is granted in the

- 4. Line up make sure you use lined paper or draw the lines yourself, so your child can get into the practice of forming the letters correctly and they learn that each letter has an upper, middle and lower zone.
- 5. Pen power find a pen that your child loves and that will capture their



imagination so they enjoy their handwriting practice. Fountain pens are great fun and have the novelty factor. The Kakuno Fountain Pen has been especially made for children – it has a thick barrel for an easy grip with a smooth flow of ink requiring no pressure.



SDRC awards tender for \$6.5M Storm King Dam pipeline

The construction of the new Storm King Dam raw water pipeline is well underway with a tender being awarded for the \$6.5M project.

Construction of the new pipeline is set to begin in early 2019 after Southern Downs Regional Council awarded the tender to Newlands Civil Construction.

A joint initiative of Southern Downs Regional Council and the Queensland State Government, the vital project will renew deteriorated raw water pipeline between Storm King Dam and Mount Marley Water Treatment Plant.

Councillor for Transport, Infrastructure and Utilities Marika McNichol said the Storm King Dam pipeline is a vital project which would deliver a quality water source to the Southern Downs community into the future.

"We are committed to upgrading and investing in the region's ageing infrastructure and delivering quality projects to the community which continually improve the liveability of the Southern Downs region," Cr McNichol said.

"The Storm King Dam pipeline project is a priority for Council and one that will ensure a continuous water supply for Stanthorpe and deliver water security to residents into the future.

"This pipeline is crucial infrastructure needed for the Southern Downs and awarding the tender for the construction and design of the project is a big leap towards its completion."

SDRC is funding more than \$2.6M of the project with the Queensland State Government contributing more than \$3.9M through the Local Government Grants and Subsidies Program (LGGSP).

Minister for Local Government Stirling Hinchliffe applauded the Council for moving forward with the project.

"This is exactly the type of important infrastructure the LGGSP is designed to help our councils deliver for their communities," Mr Hinchliffe said.

"Cr Dobie and her team are to be congratulated for taking this next step in ensuring ongoing water supply well into the future."

The new 30 centimetre wide, 8.9 kilometre pipe will replace the current infrastructure which was constructed in 1954.

Construction of the Storm King Dam pipeline is due to

commence in March and expected to be complete by December 2019.

The project will support more than 25 jobs in the Southern Downs and boost the manufacturing and construction industries.

Ergon Energy Safe Entry program

Ergon Energy workers and meter readers won't enter yards where dogs are not securely restrained as part of new safety measures introduced this week.

There were 71 injuries from dog bites and 199 other incidents and close-calls between July 2017 and October 2018.

"The safety of our employees has to come first and that means if there is a dog on a property that isn't restrained – we won't go in to do work of any kind," Area Manager Wayne Alderman said

"We'll talk to customers about what options are available and, if no one is home, we will leave information to help them do a self-read.

"In some cases where there is a dangerous dog or known access issue, a remote read meter may be installed."

The new Safe Entry measures will apply to all properties regardless of whether they are in an urban or rural setting.

"Ergon Energy will work with our customers and

communities to make the new safety measures work so we have a good outcome for our people and our customers," Mr Alderman said.

property to the end. In 1920 he entered Parliament as a Farmers' Union candidate before switching to the Country Party, the party he represented until his death. Mr. Deacon was given the portfolio of Minister for Lands when the Moore government came to power. The late Mr. Deacon's strong characteristics were his integrity and his attention to detail. He was often referred to as "Honest Bill". No politician could possibly have visited, so consistently, the various parts of the electorate as Mr. Deacon did. He generously supported many public institutions and gave his personal attention to any request from the electors, whether they were his supporters or not. The funeral took place in Allora and was largely attended.

We extend a welcome to Pte. L. F. C. (Les) Masters M.M., who after 3½ years service with the A.I.F., returned home on Thursday. Pte. Masters is the

He sailed for Egypt on December 30th 1915 and after training, proceeded to France, arriving on March 26th 1916. He saw continuous service until March 26th 1918 when he was sent to "Blighty" suffering from trench fever. After recovering, he sailed for Sunny Queensland on November 21st 1918.


The gallant young man, who celebrated his 22nd birthday on board ship on January 3rd, enlisted at the age of 18½ and is the proud possessor of that most coveted decoration, the Military Medal, received for bravery at Bullecourt. Flat batteries top reason for callouts in the Darling Downs: RACO

RACQ has motorists to make time for regular basic car maintenance checks after it attended 25,775 roadside breakdowns in the Darling Downs last year.

spokesperson RACQ Clare Hunter said the number one reason members needed RACQ Roadside Assistance in the past 12 months was for a flat battery.

"The biggest killer of batteries is heat and we experienced very temperatures last vear. It's not surprising battery problems were the top reason for callouts in 2018," Ms Hunter said.

"There are simple things you can do to avoid a flat, like not leaving lights on when the engine isn't running and regularly checking your battery for wear. Feeling a sluggish start when you turn the key can be another telltale sign you may need a new battery."

Ms Hunter said the second most common reason for calls to RACQ Roadside Assistance was a puncture or wheel change.

"Drivers should check their tyres regularly - look for foreign objects in the rubber, make sure tread is in good condition and check the air pressure is correct,' she said.

"As well as tyres. motorists should check their oil levels and have their car regularly serviced. These are really basic maintenance checks we should all be carrying out."

Ms Hunter said RACQ Roadside patrols were also called to rescue 1,696 people who had accidentally locked themselves out of their vehicle last year.

"If you find yourself in trouble, we're ready to come to the rescue," she said.
