"It's a fresh new approach but our core business and core business values will stay the same.



Australia calls for action on Wildlife Wet Mar



- Australia has called on international experts to scrutinise wildlife wet markets.
- Concerns for biosecurity and health risks from Australia at G20 Agriculture Ministers virtual meeting. Need for governments
- to acknowledge the risks and take action to protect human health and agricultural industries.

At the virtual G20 meeting of Agricultural Ministers, Australia has called for international experts to scrutinise wildlife wet markets.

These markets are a source of biosecurity and human health risks and they need to be scientifically investigated so the world



Minister for Agriculture, David Littleproud, said we need to acknowledge the risks were for both human and animal health.

"We must learn from COVID-19 on how we better manage and mitigate both human and animal biosecurity risks and to ignore wildlife wet markets in that assessment would be wrong," Minister Littleproud said.

"There are risks with wildlife wet markets and they could be as big a risk to our agricultural industries as they can be to public health so we have to understand them better.

"The G20 of Agriculture Ministers have а responsibility to lead the way and draw on global experts and engage international organisations to rationally and methodically look at the many significant risks of wildlife wet markets.

"Our people should have confidence that the food they eat is safe. We owe it to our domestic population and



our international markets. Australia also pressed G20 counties to accelerate trade negotiations, not just on tariffs but technical trade barriers that were an impediment to food supply chains.

Minister Littleproud said while there wasn't a shortage of food globally, international supply chains are being further stressed by technical trade barriers that was hindering the supply efforts.

Allora's Past 25 years ago April 1995

Anzac Day

Mr. Jim Bradfield, president of the Allora Sub-Branch RSL, said that he was pleased with the attendances at the 1995 Anzac Day commemorations. Mr. Bradfield said that the dawn service and the cemeterv commemorative service both had increased attendances. There was also a larger crowd to witness the march which started at the Council offices in Herbert Street and proceeded to the Memorial Park.

Captain Anthony Clark from the Oakey Army Aviation Centre was the guest speaker at the Memorial Park service and the guard was mounted at the cenotaph by the cadets of 19RCU from Allora and Clifton

Allora's Past 75 years ago April 1945

Anzac Day

The attendance at the Anzac Day ceremonies in Allora this year was excellent. Rev. I. Hiscock was the secretary of the committee which had charge of the arrangements, and in the arranging of the evening concert he received able assistance from Mr. J. K. Murray, president of the local subbranch of the R.S.S.A.I.L.A. The first of the ceremonies was the pilgrimage to the cemetery which took place at 9.30 a.m. The simple service there was conducted by the Rev. Hiscock and wreaths were placed on the graves of fallen soldiers.

At 2 p.m. a procession moved from the Shire Hall through the main streets of the town to the Memorial Park where a large crowd was waiting. The

procession was led by the local Salvation Army band and included members of the R.S.S.A.I.L.A., several returned soldiers of the current war, Shire councillors, representatives of lodges and other bodies, women's organizations and a large number of children.

At the monument Mr. Murray read the names of the fallen in the 1914-18 War and the present war, after which Mr. S. Tickle of the Salvation Army sounded the Last Post. Following hymns and prayers, many beautiful floral tributes were laid. The ceremony ended with the delivery of a stirring address by the Chairman of the Allora Shire Council, Cr. H. S. Warfield.

Allora's Past 100 years ago April 1920

Anzac Day The fifth anniversary of Anzac Day was

celebrated in Allora at the monument in Queen's Park at 3 p.m. where a large

gathering of citizens from Allora and district was present. The matter of speakers for the programme was arranged by the local sub-branch of the R.S.S.I.L.A. who secured the assistance of the chairman of the Shire Council, Methodist and Presbyterian ministers, together with the Adjutant of the Salvation Army. The Church of England minister was the only one asked, who would not take part in the combined celebration.


After prayers and the singing of hymns, the names on the honour roll of all men who had fallen from the district were read by the Rev. Lapthorne, followed by a minute's silence, after which the Last Post was sounded by Digger W. J. T. Neal. The last hymn "Abide with Me" was announced by Mr. Neal, followed by the Benediction pronounced by Adjutant Drury. The celebration was brought to a close by the singing of one verse of the National Anthem.




