

Police Crack Down On Drug And Property Offenders



Following a reported break in at a residence in Forde Street, Allora in late March, local Police have charged a 23 year old man, also a resident of Forde Street, with burglary and a related fraud offence as a result of the investigation. It will be further alleged that during the execution of a search warrant at the man's address, Police located a cannabis plant, a small quantity of loose cannabis, and related drug utensils. The same man along with his 22 year old girlfriend were charged with producing and possessing cannabis and possessing drug utensils. Both will be appearing at Warwick Magistrates Court at a later date.

On the 9th of April 2021. Allora Police intercepted an 18 vear old Warwick man in a vehicle on the New England Highway at Mount Marshall, During a search of the vehicle, it will be alleged that Police located approximately 28 grams of cannabis under the rear seats. The man was charged with possessing dangerous drugs and driving whilst being disqualified from holding a licence. In the days to follow, a search warrant was executed at the man's Reyburn Street address in Warwick, where Police allegedly located a quantity of loose cannabis and two mature cannabis plants totalling over 720 grams in weight, as well as various drug utensils. The same man was again charged

by way of a drug diversion for possessing dangerous drugs and drug utensils. A 37 female of the same address was charged supplying dangerous drugs. producing dangerous drugs, possessing dangerous drugs, possessing utensils, and permitting the use of a place for the commission of a drug offence. She will be appearing at Warwick Magistrates Court at a later date.

On the 27th of April 2021,

Police located two men behaving suspiciously in a vehicle parked on the New England Highway north of Allora township. As a result of a search of the vehicle and other enquiries, it was identified that one man, an 18 year old from Goondiwindi, was connected to a string of luxury vehicle thefts in the south east of the state, as well as other property offences in the Warwick area. He was ultimately arrested and charged with three counts of unlawful use of motor vehicles, receiving tainted property. attempted burglary. possessing tainted property, possessing implements used for housebreaking, possessing a knife in a public place, failing to dispose of a syringe, and driving without a licence. The second man, a 28 year old Toowoomba man, was charged with possessing explosives (ammunition), failing to dispose of a syringe, and possessing implements used for house breaking. Both will be appearing at Warwick Magistrates Court at a later date.



This is your opportunity, like Lesley, to tell your story: if you live, work, own a business or play in the valley this is your chance to document your story for future generations to come.




"The simplest things are often easily forgotten, so make sure you double check you've locked all doors and windows before you set off.

"If you can afford to, invest in a timer for your lights or television, a security camera or even technology which allows you to control features in your home via your phone.

Three Wattles players and two coaching staff were members of the Toowoomba Clydesdales open side that won the historic 47th Battalion Trophy undefeated over the weekend in Bundaberg

While Wattles were not represented in the open women's Mustangs, those in Clydesdales colours included team coach Luke Duggan and co-coach Louis Reen. along with players Dale Perkins, Tv Gardner and 20-vear-old Matt Christensen making his senior representative debut.

The Toowoomba region left no doubt in the minds of rugby league connoisseurs across the Queensland Rugby League's Central Division that the Toowoomba Clydesdales and the South West Mustangs Open Women were the benchmark at the weekend's 47th Battalion Divisional Championship with both sides finishing the prestigious undefeated annual event Champions.

It was a historic performance for the South West Mustangs women successful in winning the tournament for the first time in the initial year of an open women's competition in the league stronghold of Toowoomba.

The Toowoomba Clydesdales outfit overwhelmed Wide Bay in their first game 34-8, before outlasting the Rockhampton Rustlers 24-20 in a nail biter.

Sunday's final went down to the wire with the Clydesdales emerging 20-16 winners over the Sunshine Coast Falcons.

Highfields's half Cory McGrady won player of the final honours, while Goondiwindi flying winger David Armstrong was named Player of the Carnival.

Wattles top graders Matt Duggan, Jackson Green and Joe Mu'a were also named in the


Memorial

On-Farm Emergency Water Infrastructure Rebate Scheme Extended Further 12 Months

Farmers impacted by drought will be given another 12 months to apply for funding from the Onfarm Emergency Water Infrastructure Rebate Scheme (EWIRS) to help them build much needed infrastructure to make their properties drought resilient.

Farmers will now have until June 2022 to utilise the \$50 million in funding secured for the EWIRS by the Coalition Government in the 2020-21 Budget.

Maranoa MP David Littleproud said he fought hard for this win for farmers

in Maranoa and the funds will now be available for another year.

"The Coalition Government has listened to farmers in Maranoa and recognised the importance of the scheme by doubling the Federal funding available as well as extending the time frame," Mr Littleproud said.

"This is great news for drought affected farmers as these rebates empower farmers to take proactive steps to ensure their properties remain drought resilient.

"All we need now is for

the Queensland State Labor Government to hurry up and sign up to the program so Queensland farmers can access this funding.

"This has been a hugely popular program that's made a real difference for thousands of Australian farmers facing the devastating challenges of drought.

"I've heard and seen first hand how drought affected farmers have put in bores, dams and pipes - now even more farmers will get this opportunity.

"While the program was and continues to be funded by the Federal Government, it was managed by the Queensland State Labor Government, which allowed the program to be heavily oversubscribed and farmers left out of pocket.

Optiweigh is a fully portable inpaddock weighing system that works in all environments, does not require animal training, and does not require installation of additional infrastructure.

"Our operation is focused on meeting target weights for target markets, which is why assessing weight gain was so critical." Mr Mitchell said.

"Having the unit in the paddock feeding data to us means we can assess our cattle every day, delivering up to \$70 more per head going out the gate on every truckload because we are better meeting sale specifications and avoiding overweight penalties."








