
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

He was always a regular on the streets of Allora, whether it was delivering goods or mowing grass.

Lawrie will be remembered for hanging out the car window to acknowledge the locals.


When delivering the mail Lawrie would say "how ya going.....good." (his answer, not yours).

Lawrie spent most of the last 5 years delivering meat for Aaron and Ashley at Allora Butchery.

David and Zita Dwan from Allora Newsagency tells us that Lawrie started delivering papers for them, 7 days a week from approximately 2000 to 2023.

Volunteer work was high on Lawrie's list of "to do" - over time he tended to the needs of the Allora Cemetery, the former Blue Care Facility, Allora Cricket Grounds, private residences, the Allora RSL and was dedicated to the detailed manicuring of the Allora Showgrounds Dog Arenas.

Lawrie's funeral took place on Monday 25th March at the Allora Cemetery.

Lawrie was born 7/12/1943 a significant milestone in the family as he shared the same birthday as his Late Uncle Bill Ellis, Mary Ellis and Andrew Slatter son of Robbie Slatter.

Lawrie didn't have the usual upbringing with a mother and father. He was raised in Allora by our grandmother Olive Emily Ellis. Our grandparents had 10 children. The older half had left home so Lawrie had the five remaining uncles and aunts to help with his upbringing. Viv, twins Don and George, Alf aka Rolly (Debbie's father) Daphne and Neil.

As a youngster he was a very proud mascot for his footy team the Allora Wattles.

As a working young man he was a butcher. He was also was the most well-respected mailman and paper delivery man.

As he grew old he became an awarded community worker.

Laurie was a beautiful soul with a heart of gold. He was a very quiet private person. Sometimes talkative, sometimes he didn't give a lot away. Once he said to me — "if you don't say anything — You can't get into trouble."

He loved Allora, never wanted to live or die anywhere else. We all knew this was to be Lawrie's final resting spot.

So now he will rest in peace, surrounded by the same family that raised him.

He will be sorely missed by The Family and the Allora Community.

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Council's Local Housing Action Plan

Southern Downs Regional Council is working with the Queensland Government and the Local Government Association of Queensland on a joint initiative to respond to a range of immediate, emerging and long-term housing challenges in the Southern Downs through

the Southern Downs Local Housing Action Plan (LHAP). Council's Chief Executive Officer Dave Burges said the plan provides an overview of key community and housing characteristics, as well as emerging issues related to housing in the region. In 2019, Council engaged the services

of Foresight Partners to prepare a Housing Needs Assessment Report to inform the preparation of a new Southern Downs town planning scheme. The primary purpose of the study was to determine the adequacy of existing zoning allocations in the current planning scheme to accommodate projected growth to 2041 in the five key urban areas of Warwick, Stanthorpe, Allora, Killarney, and Wallangarra, as well as accommodate the planned growth and dwelling targets of the Shaping Southern Downs plan. "Council is playing its role in working with local stakeholders, community housing providers and the Queensland Government to

maximise opportunities and meet the region's housing needs." Mr Burgess said. The LHAP aligns with Council's existing Land Optimisation Strategy 2023 that aims to optimise available land to meet community housing needs and free-up Council controlled land for sensible development. The plan can be reviewed at www.sdrcl.qld.gov.au/council/publications/general-publications. This project is being funded with the support of the Queensland Government under the Queensland Housing & Homelessness Action Plan 2021-2025 to support local housing outcomes.

\$2.3m flood resilience works to begin at Wheatvale

Major works are underway on Connells Bridge Road with upcoming works to commence on Wheatvale Plains Road after Easter and expected to be completed by June this year. Southern Downs Council's Chief Executive Officer Dave Burges said "Both Connells Bridge Road and Wheatvale Plains Road are susceptible to prolonged closures during floods and they sustained major damage in the 2020, 2021 and 2022 events which left the roads closed for multiple weeks. "As these roads provide essential access for local farmers, producers and residents, the impact of the road closures was felt across the community."

Leader of The Nationals and Federal Member for Maranoa David Littleproud said the crucial works would offer long-term benefits for the region. "The Southern Downs community showed incredible resilience during flood events from 2020 to 2022 and these vital works will go a long way to repairing key roads for the region," Mr Littleproud said. "It gives me great pride to have helped secure the federal funds to make these projects a reality and I look forward to seeing the positive long-term impacts they will have for the community." The roads will be closed for the duration of the project and traffic will be temporarily detoured via Blacksoil Lane.

Regular inspections and maintenance of the gravel road will be undertaken, and motorists are reminded to drive to conditions. Connells Bridge Road is currently closed and Wheatvale Plains Road will close after Easter. The existing sealed bridge approaches at

Connells Bridge Road will be replaced with concrete pavements. Wheatvale Plains Road will be lowered through the floodway located just north of Blacksoil Lane and replaced with a foam bitumen pavement with concrete and rock erosion edge protection.



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Farmers To Be Hit By Labor's New Tax

Labor's fresh food tax has been passed in the House of Representatives, in a move that will drive up the cost-of-living and make groceries more expensive at the checkout.

Leader of The Nationals and Federal Member for Maranoa

David Littleproud said Labor's legislation is an attack on families and farmers.

The new tax, called a biosecurity protection levy, will force farmers to pay for the biosecurity risks of international importers.

"In what parallel universe would a government charge its own farmers to pay for the risks their competitors are creating?" Mr Littleproud said.

"This new tax will hurt families at a time they can least afford it and farmers who are already

under pressure.

"It doesn't make sense at all and comes amid a cost-of-living crisis. Farmers will be forced to pass on costs, meaning families will feel more pain at the grocery checkout."

Mr Littleproud said the agriculture industry is worth \$80 billion but despite its huge importance, debate about the tax was held in the Federation Chamber rather than the House of Representatives.

Mr Littleproud said the move to water down its significance was not just insulting and hurtful but also showed how little Labor cares about the agriculture industry.

Just three Labor MPs debated the Agriculture (Biosecurity Protection) Levies and Charges Collection Bill 2024, while 20 Coalition speakers stood up for farmers.

"That an issue of such significance was moved out of the House of Representatives demonstrates Labor's regard for our farmers and regional and rural communities.

"Labor's callous treatment of the agriculture industry and farmers is shameful." Mr Littleproud said.

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Wattles Take On Oakey Bears

The Wattles Warriors kick off their 58th year in the Toowoomba Rugby League competition on Sunday against the Oakey Bears at Platz Oval to commence the 2024 TRL 106th fixture season.

Coincidentally Sunday will also see Oakey commence their 58th season in the TRL.

Along with the Bears and Warriors, the Millmerran Rams and the Pittsworth Danes all joined the league back in 1967.

The Travis Burns coached Wattles A Grade side finished 4th in the 2023 premiership, but an enthusiastic band of Bears under coach Wes Amau are looking forward to an intense battle on the Warriors home turf.

"Wattles are known for their prowess, especially when playing at home, they're formidable opponents across all grades."

Oakey recently matched up against Brothers for the pre-season Mark Barrett Shield, Brothers snaring the honours in a closely fought 22 - 18 win at Glenholme Park.

Wattles' top side's two match pre-season has seen them head into the new fixture season with an unblemished record after a 24 - 14 success over Pittsworth and last week's 22 - 12 Barrett Family Shield victory over the Warwick Cowboys.

The Warriors looked a well-oiled unit against the Cowboys,

and while Burns is inclined to stick with his tested Barrett Shield line-up, former Queensland Rangers half Matt Duggan will ease back into his favoured number seven jumper for Sunday's clash.

The 'Farm Spray' Wattles reserve grade side may have finished behind Warwick 6 - 12 in their recent trial, but coach Tony Morris has full confidence in his Warriors outfit's ability to perform against Oakey.

A significant plus for the Warriors is the return to the playing field of teak tough forward and first grade premiership winner Ryan Duggan.

Duggan will add much to the line-up in leadership, experience and ability, a former Wattles Clifton Courier Player of the Year in 2017.

Wattles Cameron Hamblin coached 'Black Toyota' Under 19 team will sit out their first fixture round given the Oakey Bears won't be fielding a team in that age group this season.

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

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State Success for Allora Swimmers

Allora locals Will Day and Bailey Harm were two of the four members of the Darling Downs 16 years boys 4 x 50m Freestyle team that brought home the State Silver medal at the Queensland School Sport Championships. The

boys were joined by a swimmer from Dalby and another from Toowoomba. Bailey anchored the relay for the Darling Downs Team in a blistering 23.04 seconds.

Bailey Harm secured three Queensland School Sport

Championship titles winning three gold in the 100m Free, 50 Free and 50 Back. He also won silver in the 50 breaststroke and 50 butterfly.

Bailey set the pace in the 16 years 50 Free, his best swim at the Championships in the heats clocking a 23.91, falling 0.05 seconds short of the 23.86 Qld Schools record held by current World Champion Cameron McEvoy.

Bailey was selected to the Queensland School Sport Team to compete at the School Sport Australia National Championships

on the Gold Coast in July.

This comes on the back of his recent triple gold win at the Queensland Sprint Championships where Bailey received his first Swimming Queensland Major Award for "Male Swimmer of the Meet", selected from all competitors at the state wide event.

In the last event of the summer season, Bailey will now contest five events at the Swimming Australia National Age Championships also being held on the Gold Coast from 7th to 14th April.
